MONDAY

CONDITION MUCH IMPROVED.—The Guardian is pleased to report that His Lordship Bishop O'Leary, who has been ill for some time, is now on the road to a good recovery. His Lordship officiated at Confirmation at the Cathedral yesterday afternoon.

SNOW STORM?—Lowering clouds and a falling temperature early yesterday morning, with a stiff north east wind brought a cold rain which continued throughout the day, and towards evening turned to hail. About 8 o'clock last night, snow began to fall, and at 9 o'clock it looked for a while as if the Province was in for an old time snow storm. However, the wind continued moderate, and shifted a quarter. At 11 o'clock over half an inch had fallen, unprecedented in the Island's history for some years. At 12.30 last night it was mild, but still snowing.

SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED.—Before leaving this city on Tuesday morning, Professor H. A. McPhee, president of the Toronto Maritime Provinces' Association announced the award by that association of two scholarships to the University of Toronto for investigation into Maritime industries, the funds for which have been contributed by former Maritimers resident in that city. One scholarship of \$600 has already been awarded to a student who will soon be in the Maritimes to investigate into the lumber industry. The second will go to a university graduate and will be held in the University of Toronto. The nominations are being forwarded by Maritime universities.

EDITOR IN CITY

Among the visitors to this city on Monday was Mr. John Currie of St. John's, Newfoundland, president and managing editor of "The News" of that city. Mr. Currie was a delegate to the recent conference of Rotarians held in Halifax and during his stay there decided to take a trip to Prince Edward Island of which he had heard a great deal. Mr. Currie was a guest of the Rotary Club of this city on Monday and was greatly interested in the address of Professor McPhee, "Consolidating Confederation." The attitude of the Ancient Colony on this question, he said, is to-day just as independent as it always has been. Economic conditions are generally satisfactory and declared that Newfoundland has immense national assets to fall back upon. He was loud in his praises of this city and province.

SHIPWRECKED.—Three West Cape men barely managed to make their way to shore when on Friday morning their schooner foundered about ten miles off the east coast of this province. They had left Port Hawkesbury, N. S., the previous day with a cargo of coal. During the night the schooner sprang a leak and the men took to a small boat just in time to see her sink beneath the waves. After a terrible experience in the heavy sea, they landed on Boughton Island and were refreshed by a hot breakfast served by Mrs. Goteff, who has charge of the cook-house of the Eastern Canneries there. The Captain's name is Smith and his brother and son were the other members of the crew.

DEATH OF MR. SYLVERE GAUDET.—The death occurred at his home in Summerside on Sunday morning of Mr. Sylvere Gaudet at the early age of 41 years. The deceased had been in failing health since Christmas but had not taken to his bed. He was about as usual last week, but was taken suddenly ill in the night and passed away at 10 o'clock on Sunday morning. He was a native of Misouche but had resided in Summerside since his marriage.
