The goodly number which attended his funeral testified to the high esteem in which he was held by all who had the pleasure of knowing him. The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Stewart of Valleyfield. The pall bearers were L. D. McPherson, D. Bruce, K. McLean S. B. Weatherbie, S. Jardine, H. Martin.—Com.

The Wesleyan has the following obituary notice in a recent issue. John Bentley was born at Margate, Prince Edward Island, in 1822, and died at North Rustico, on April 22nd, of the present year, in the 87th year of his age. He had the advantage of a godly parentage and was brought up in the fear and admonition of the Lord. At the age of twenty, in the year 1842, under the ministry of the Rev. A. McLeod, he was soundly converted to God, and at once united with the Methodist church of which he was a member for the space of sixty seven years. The greater part of his life was spent in his native place, where he made a fine impression and exercised a wholesome influence as a man of Christian character. About twenty years ago he removed to the Tryon Circuit and identified himself with the varied interests of the churches there. At Crapaud said Victoria, he gave of his best to the cause he so much loved, and his excellent service as Class Leader, Sabbath School Teacher, and Exhorter, had great weight with all. He was a man to be trusted. His sterling worth, simple faith, consistent life, and unflinching zeal in the work of God have left an abiding impression in the places where he is best known. When he left Crapaud for Charlottetown a few years ago, his friends presented him with an address of appreciation, accompanied by a substantial gift as an expression of their esteem and affection. Four years ago, after the death of his wife, he removed to North Rustico, and lived with his step-daughter with whom he quietly spent the evening of his life. The faith that sustained through his long and honorable career did not fall him at the close. When the end came as it did suddenly it found him joyously awaiting the summons of the Master. It may be fitly said of him, "He was a good man, and faithful." Three sons and two daughters are left behind, who may thank God for the heritage of a good example. T. H.

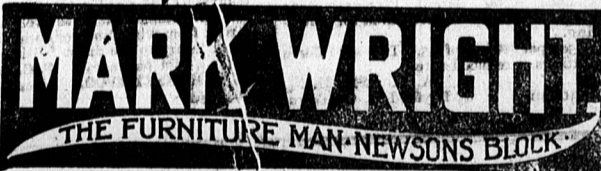
