to their own people. It would be an excellent way of helping the people and the province, and it was a matter that should be taken up. Every bit of harness used by the people today was imported, that should not be. They had all the opportunities here of manufacturing it themselves, and that would give a great deal of employment to the people and would save a great deal of money.

AGRICULTURAL AID.

With reference to the increased grant received under the Agricultural Aid Act, he might say that last year the grant was increased from \$17,000 to \$26,500 odd. Next year, he thought, it would be increased still more, and he thought they if those farmers did not thank the present Government at Ottawa for being so generous to them, of the \$700,000 granted last year for agriculture aid to the different provinces, if we had got what we were entitled to by population, we would only have got \$9,000. Instead of that we got \$26,500. And he thought that that had been put to good use in increasing agriculture and increasing agricultural aid, in one way or another, it had helped the province a great deal. As far as the staff of the Commissioner of Agriculture was concerned, he did not think they could find a more efficient and painstaking body of workers in the way in which they went through the country doing their best to give the farmers instructions in agricultural matters, and if those farmers did not benefit by them, they did not deserve to. In reference to the egg industry Mr. Jenkins testified to the great benefits of the egg circles, and in his opinion there was no branch of agriculture that had prospered more than the poultry industry within the last two years. The egg circles had given the farmers from two cents to ten cents a dozen more for their eggs than they would have got from the wholesale dealers either in country or town, and by means of the improvement wrought about by the egg circles they were able themselves to send their eggs away to Halifax, St. John, Sydney and as far as Montreal and get better prices for them. He thought that the doing away with the middle-man was going to give the farmer a better margin of profit. People spoke of the high cost of living and said it was due to the farmers, but if the farmer got all the money that the consumer had got to pay for the necessities of life, he would be the wealthiest man in the country today. But he did not get more than a third of it; the other two-thirds went to the middle-man. But that was changed today and when the car ferry started and the other branches of agriculture were taken up in the same way as the egg circles and the farmer shipped direct he would get the returns he was entitled to, and deprive the middleman of his profits.

The long and short courses in agriculture conducted by the Department of Agriculture had been of great benefit to the young men of this province and also to many of the old men. The short course had been well attended, but he thought that in the succeeding years it would be better attended. With these courses the students would be able to take up different branches of agriculture and they would be able to give employment to their own young men instead of employing those from other provinces, or if they preferred it, they would be able to go elsewhere and take up agricultural positions there. With the exception he thought of Mr. LeLachur and the Secretary, every one of their Agricultural instructors had been imported, where their own young men should be doing the work. Valuable work was being done in regard to the Domestic Science and by the women's institutes, which latter had been established all through the country today and these were doing he thought a wonderful work; not only were its members learning proper ways of cooking and sanitary and hygienic methods but they took a great deal of interest in the school work and in seeing that the school was equipped properly and conducted in a sanitary hygienic line, maintaining for one thing the dangers of infectious diseases.

MUSSELI, MUD DREDGE.

With reference to the proposal, as a further aid to agriculture, to put into operation by the Government during this summer a self-loading and self-discharging dredge for oyster mud, at St. Peter's Bay, Mr. Jenkins thought it would prove a great benefit to the people of the Island. Today it was almost impossible to get imported lime-stone; it had gone up in price nearly double within the last twenty years, and though the farmers could not get the mud they must have the lime. But it was almost impossible for them to get all the mud they wanted, and the establishment of that dredge at St. Peter's Bay would thus be of great benefit, and by its means he thought that not only would the farmers be able to get the mud more easily but about 150 per cent. cheaper than they were paying today. He was sure that once it was started and the farmers saw the benefit of it the dredge would not be able to meet the demands upon it.

EDUCATIONAL MATTERS.

Discussing educational matters, Mr. Jenkins, referred to the speech made by the Leader of the Opposition at Montague last year. As near as he could remember, the Hon. gentleman was reported to have said that the Government had made a failure of the educational work, or had done very little for the education of the province. The speaker thought he

Last year it was between four and five thousand dollars, and although he had not got the figures for this year he felt that it would be considerably more. He knows it is a foolish and fatuous habit. He remembers the headaches it has bestowed upon him. Yet he goes on providing himself with the same old headache and the same old heart-ache. SECOND SIGHT

The newspapers are constantly reporting cases of remarkable dreams and second sight, and that there is a good deal of truth in them is not denied by those who have studied the subjects.
