FREDERICK B. STRETCH A wide circle of citizens were shocked and deeply grieved when it was learned, on the evening of Thursday, February 20th, that Mr. Frederick B. Stretch of Long Creek had passed away at his residence. The deceased had reached the ripe old age of 83 years, but so pleasant and companionable was he, to both old and young, that only his passing brought to all the fact of his full years.

Mr. Stretch was a son of the late Joseph and Emma Chadwick Stretch, who emigrated to this province from England. He was born on the farm on which he spent his life; on the goodly acres which he carefully and intelligently tilled. Scores of friends and neighbors will long remember the genial friendliness of his house, who never failed to extend a warm happy smiling welcome to all who joined the family circle.

On this farm he raised his family, and among his children and friends, he lived a life full of honor, respect and contentment. Not only was he a kind, faithful husband and father, but a fine lovable companion, particularly of the younger generation. Mr. Stretch was a wide reader and an interesting and informed conversationalist. No wonder many hearts were grieved and many regrets expressed at his passing.

Mr. Stretch is survived by his widow, Sarah McLean, his sons, Norman, Fred, and Joseph, and his daughter, Frederick W. on an adjacent farm, Herbert, Frank and Joseph in Prince Edward Island, also thirty-one grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. One daughter, Marion, died some years ago.

BRENT HORNE

WESTVILLE, March 25. — The town of Westville suffered the loss of a sterling and highly esteemed citizen today in the passing of Brent Horne, at his home, Main St., at one o'clock, death being attributed to a heart attack. Mr. Horne has been in indifferent health for some time. He was a veteran of the First Great War and his health was somewhat impaired as the result of service overseas. He was a native of Prince Edward Island but had been a resident of Westville for some twenty-five years.

He took an active interest, and was a keen curler in the Westville Curling Club, where he served formerly as President, and at the time of his death held executive offices in the club. He was also a Past-Grand Master of the Westville Branch, Canadian Legion No. 85. His wife, who survives him was the former Margaret Dalling, Westville. An only child, he predeceased him several years ago. The late Mr. Horne was a member of the Westville St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church.

Count Edward R. Raczeski's Polish Ambassador in London has sent the Canadian Red Cross Society an expression of gratitude for the help given by the Society overseas in supplying woolen comforts and hospital supplies to the Polish troops in England. Count Raczeski's message delivered to Major C. A. Scott, overseas commissioner, says: "It is with very deep gratitude that I thank you for this generous assistance and I am certain that our people will be greatly indebted to the Canadian Red Cross Society for such kind and thoughtful action."

In the past 70 days, the Red Cross in England has released such staggering quantities of woolen comforts, relief clothing and surgical supplies that the Overseas office has stated that further shipments "in as large quantities as possible" will be urgently required. To relieve committees alone, including the Polish, and the Women's Voluntary Services have been given since January 376,055 woolen comforts and 225,666 articles of relief clothing. Blankets, quilts, and relief clothing are needed immediately.

Major Scott has cabled, to date the Canadian Red Cross has devoted two million dollars to the relief of bomb victims in England.

EMPIRE RACES UNITED FOR WAR SINGAPORE, March 26.-(CP)—Administration for the war work being done by British and other women in the Far East was expressed by Prof. Wilfrid Cullis, a London University lecturer, after she completed a propaganda tour under the auspices of the British Ministry of Information. She toured Japan, Shanghai, Hong Kong, The Netherlands East Indies and Malaya. She will spend a holiday in Australia before returning to England.

"One of the most heartening and marvelous features of this war which I have noticed in my travels," she said, "is the way women of the Empire, women of all races, have come together to do all they can towards the war effort."
