THE RUSSIAN PARLIAMENT.

The full text of the Czar's ukase defining the powers of the two Houses of the proposed Russian Parliament throws new light upon its complexion. The Upper House, to be known as the Council of the Empire and the popular branch to be called the National Assembly, will have equal powers to initiate legislation and all measures must pass both Houses before being submitted to the Emperor who has an absolute veto power. The Council will be composed of members one half of whom are appointed by the Emperor, and twenty-six, elected from the nobility and clergy, thus giving the Government full control of the body.

The members elected to the National Assembly will all be required before taking their seats to swear fidelity to the Emperor, Autocrat of Holy Russia. This is intended to shut out all republicans; revolutionists, and those who believe in parliamentary rather than autocratic Government. Moreover the Government retains the power to promulgate laws during the recess of Parliament, and the Parliament can only meet when called by the Emperor, and may be prorogued or dissolved at any time.

Other notable restrictions include the following. A measure which passes the Assembly and is rejected by the Council cannot be again introduced except by special permission of the Emperor. And the National Assembly is to have nothing to do with reports of the Minister of Finance on the state of the treasury; or with charges of misconduct of Ministers, Governors, Members of Council or Commanders of the army or navy; or with titles of nobility or entailed estates; or with the establishment of stock companies with special privileges. It will be seen that the elected House will be chiefly noteworthy at the outset for the things it may not do.

The Russian Parliament will therefore be extremely unlike the British or Canadian Parliaments. It will be bound hand and foot to do nothing, or to carry out the imperial will. But either gradually it will burst these bonds and its powers will be enlarged by constitutional process or the Russian people will seek for liberty by the bloody short-cut of revolution. The creation of a Parliament even with the limited powers conferred on the National Assembly, is a long stride forward, chiefly because it opens the way for public discussion of national affairs by elected representatives. All else that makes for liberty must follow, however slowly it may come.

It seems hardly necessary to refer to an absurd rumor as to the value of Merchant's Bank notes, growing out of the transfer to the Canadian Bank of Commerce. These notes will be as they always have been as good as gold. They will be redeemed at any time by the Canadian Bank of Commerce after it obtains possession of the business of the local Bank. For that matter all the notes of all the chartered Banks of Canada are now guaranteed, and even if a Bank were to fail, the holders of its notes would be paid in full out of a fund controlled by the Finance Department of the Ottawa Government. Every genuine Canadian banknote is worth its face value in gold, and the taking over of the business of one Bank by another in no way affects the value of the notes in circulation.

CANADIAN RAILWAYS.

According to the latest report of the Department of Railways Canada has 194 steam railroads, with 20,001 miles of track. The increase of mileage during last year was 900 miles. At this rate we shall soon have enough rails laid down to encircle the earth with double bands of steel at the equator. The trains on Canadian railways made altogether a running distance of 65,984,114 miles, or more than equal to two thirds the distance from the earth to the sun. This is equivalent to more than three thousand two hundred trains over every mile of track laid down.

The trains carried over 25 million passengers, being the equivalent of four rides for every man, woman and child in the country. The trains also carried over 50 million tons of freight, or more than eight tons per head of our total population. As compared with the previous year the railways carried 1,047,808 more passengers, 2,706,438 more tons of freight and ran 4,622,112 miles further. This shows that pretty big business was done, notwithstanding the deep snows of last winter.

The sad side of the picture is that 408 persons were killed and 1,357 persons injured on the Canadian railways within the year. Of the killed 35 were passengers, 303 employees and 225 others. Of the injured 244 were passengers, and 919 employees. The slaughter and maiming were equivalent to the casualties of a considerable battle. There is surely room for improvement here. So far we have spoken of steam railways.

There are also 183 miles of electric railways in Canada, mostly within city or suburban districts. These railways carried for short distances 22,777,319 passengers, or seven eighths as many as the steam railways. The electric only killed 56 persons and injured 1,230. The steam and electric roads together carried over 48 million passengers, or say eight times the total population of the country, and killed 324 and injured 2,636 persons. The killed and injured make a total of 3,160, or say, one fourth as many people as there are in Charlottetown. This is far too many. Still 714,283 passengers appear to have been carried safely for every passenger killed, and 102,000 for every passenger injured on the steam railways.

The British and Foreign Bible Society reports largely increased sales of Bibles in Russia since the war with Japan, especially of the cheap editions. It appears that one reason for this is that many of the Russian soldiers in Manchuria promised to purchase Bibles if they reached their homes again safely, and they look upon this promise as a solemn vow.

Not many important measures are promised in the speech with which Lord Grey opened Parliament yesterday, but much more may be given than is promised. The date for ending the fiscal year is to be changed to 31st March, while measures for the better observance of the Lord's Day, to amend the Railway Act, the Fruit Marks Act, the Dominion Elections Act, and measures to provide for forest reserves and to deal with usury are promised. No reference is made to the expected tariff changes.
