EDITORIAL NOTES.

The Patriot, in sheer silliness inquires whether THE GUARDIAN knows when it is beaten? THE GUARDIAN has had no experiences in that line. The Patriot no doubt knows how it feels. When the organ of a great party has nothing more to say or do for itself or its friends than to propound an insane question like that, the public will draw the conclusion that it is not only beaten but realises the fact.

Mr. Costigan has made his promised statement as to the reasons why he left the Conservative party, and he dates the beginning of his estrangement to the time when he remained true to Sir Mackenzie Bowell as leader, while Mr. Foster and others revolted. He says he afterward joined Sir Charles Tupper's government with great hesitation, and only did so as a representative Irish-Catholic. Sir Charles Tupper's reply as outlined in an Ottawa despatch appears to have been temperate in tone and yet forcible. Mr. Costigan had no doubt shared in framing the protective policy and in shaping the course taken by the Conservative party in regard to the Manitoba school question. Moreover Sir Charles did not fail to remind him that he stayed with his party while it was in power and had favors to bestow but deserted them after their defeat.

A very singular case is that of the two Galicians who were tried for murder, found guilty and sentenced to death by the trial judge, but who were not executed at the time named for their execution. The sheriff had been notified by telegraph that the crown would not interfere to put off the execution, but he waited for specific instructions to proceed with the execution. That was a rather senseless blunder, no doubt, but what was now to be done? The sheriff had certainly no authority to hang these men before the day named in their sentence, and it may be doubted whether he had authority to execute them on a subsequent day. He did, as a matter of fact hang them on Saturday, the day after the date fixed by the Judge. English precedents show that the convicts may be re-sentenced and under such new authority from the court the sentence of death may be carried into effect but in this case we are not told that the convicts were sentenced a second time.

DEATH OF MRS. MCLEAN.

The Widow of the Late Capt. McLean Dies Suddenly of Heart Failure.

On Saturday night, as usual, Mrs. John McLean retired for the night at her home at Mrs. Fraser's, Kent Street. About one o'clock Sunday morning she gave the alarm of feeling unwell. A doctor was summoned and her sister Mrs. Stanley, was sent for. Both quickly arrived but it was noticed that the shadows of the end were gathering; and in less than an hour from the first intimation of her illness the curtain of death had fallen. It will be remembered that her husband, Cap. John McLean, also died suddenly at Pictou some years ago. No arrangements have been made for the funeral the announcement of which will be made later. Mrs. McLean was a member of Zion Church and was much loved by a wide circle of friends throughout the city.

She leaves one daughter, Bessie, now in Boston, a son by a former marriage, now in California, and two sisters, Mrs. Stanley and Mrs. William Chandler.

REV. H. B. SWABEY'S DEATH.

Formerly Rector of St. John's Episcopal Church, Port Hill.

In another column will be found recorded the death of the Rev. H. B. Swabey, M. A., of Bath, England. He was the eldest surviving son of the late Capt. Wm. Swabey, (R.H.A.) J.P., who for a number of years resided in Charlottetown. Mr. Swabey was rector of St. John's Church, Port Hill, for a number of years. In 1871 he removed from the Island and went to Calais, France, from there he moved to Farnington, Berkshire, England, and afterwards to Bath. He married the second daughter of Rev. L. C. Jenkins, D. C. L. Three of his sons are surgeons in the British army. The late Mr. Swabey was an uncle of Dr. R. Jenkins and a brother-in-law of Mr. F. W. Hales and Miss Jenkins of this City.

MOUNT ALLISON.

The Closing Exercises of the Educational Institutions, Sackville.

SACKVILLE, May 25.—The first entertainment was given Thursday evening in Beethoven hall, a brilliant concert by the conservatory staff. The house was well filled, everyone having looked forward to this event with eagerness. All eyes were turned on the new Karn Warren pipe organ which has just been erected. It is a fine three-manual instrument and is a most slightly addition to the hall, with its pipes painted in a soft oak shade with gilt ornaments. The program was up to a high standard.

SACKVILLE, May 26.—Beginning with Friday morning, the art gallery has been thrown open to the public, and many have already availed themselves of the privilege. The exhibit is an excellent one for while not many showy pictures are seen, a close observer will notice a steady growth in real artistic merit. This is especially true of the drawings in which a firm ground work has been laid. Great stress has been put on corrections in this important department, it being as impossible to have good painting without correct drawing as a human form would be perfect without a properly articulated skeleton. The attendance at the studio has been the largest yet, this year, and great interest is manifested by the pupils. Additional departments this year were the mechanical drawing class which gives valuable instruction in architectural and civil engineering drawing, and the modelling class which has made a good beginning and expects to do greater things in the future.

Good pictures have also been turned out by Misses F. Bowles, F. Vroom and N. Poole.

At four o'clock one of the prettiest performances of all the exercises took place, the physical culture drill on the ladies college lawn under Miss Webster's able instruction. The young ladies were uniformly attired in dark skirts with white blouses and marched with great exactness. Several new figures were gone through and care and grace were displayed in all. There were a large number of spectators.

The elocution competition by university students which always excites a good deal of interest, was given in Langley hall Friday evening. With the exception of Miss Bowles none of the speakers had received any instruction in the noble art of oratory.
