GERALD ST. CLAIR TRAINOR

The death occurred at the Charlottetown Hospital on Wednesday, March 4, 1943, of Gerald St. Clair Trainor, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Wilbur Trainor of West Royalty. "Jerry" as he was more familiarly known was of a kind, gentle and humorous disposition which attracted both young and old to his side. He was a great lover of sports, especially hockey and played several seasons in the community. In such, he was always noted for his fair dealing and good sportsmanship.

Both young and old were twenty-three years ago, he moved to West Royalty, when a small boy, with his parents. He received his early education at St. Dunstan's school and later attended St. Dunstan's University for two years. When the war broke out in 1939, he enlisted with the Canadian Army Medical Corps and was attached to the 21st and 22nd Field Ambulance with which he served for a year and a half when he was discharged for physical reasons. He then accepted a position with the Island Motor Transport which he held until the time of his death.

He returned to his home in West Royalty on Friday morning, February 19th, to St. Dunstan's Basilica where Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Louis Dougan who also conducted services at the grave. Seated in the sanctuary were Rev. George MacDonald of St. Dunstan's University and Rev. Wm. MacDonald of Seven Mile Bay. The pall bearers were six soldiers from Beach Cove Training Camp. While an escort party composed of Lieut. G. MacDonnell, Capt. J. MacDonnell and other members of the Canadian Legion.

National Gallery

Art Exhibition
In Charlottetown

The first travelling exhibition of the National Gallery, Ottawa, is to open at the Harris Memorial Gallery on this Wednesday afternoon.

The purpose of the art society of P. E. Island this season is to bring to the public exhibitions, smaller in number but each painting one of outstanding merit by a great Canadian painter. Of the six great paintings which constitute the present exhibition, the outstanding picture is "The Meeting of the School Trustees" by the late Robert Harris. This magnificent picture, a study of work shows a mastery of portraiture and beautiful lighting little seen in today's painting.

It has been exhibited in the "The Gallery" in London, Eng., and was at Rideau Hall during the royal visit of Their Majesties in 1939.

James Wilson Morrice, Montreal born Canadian painter, student of the Art Institute Julian, Paris, was the author of the delightful view of Paris painted from his own studio window. A contemporary of James McNeill Whistler, he later turned to painting the snow scenes and Habitants of his native Canada, died in Tunis in 1924.

Maurice Cullen, born in Newfoundland, but all of his later life a resident of Montreal, the author of the delightful view of Paris, was mainly a painter in oils, delicately of snow scenes in surrounding Quebec. One of the great Canadian landscape painters.

George Agnew Reid, born in Ontario, studied at the Ontario College of Art, a student of Robert Harris, later studied in Philadelphia and Paris. His painting in the present exhibition shows a very decorative quality in style and lovely coloring typical of his work. He still resides in Toronto.

J. W. Beatty, born in Toronto where he studied privately, later at the Art Institute Julian, Paris, under Jean Paul Laurens, Benjamin Constant. A teacher at the Ontario school of Art, he had a definite influence on Canadian Art. Died in Toronto a few years ago.
