Prevent formation of cream of tartar crystals in the finished jelly, let the extracted juice stand overnight in cold place. Next morning carefully dip out the juice and re-strain it through a jelly bag. The crystals remain with the sediments on bottom and sides of the container.

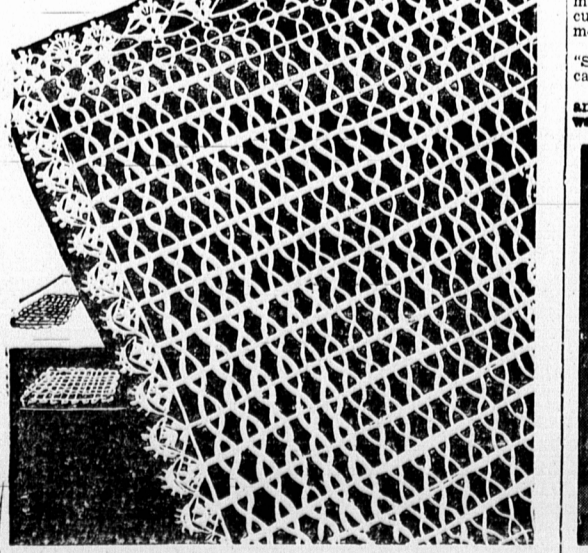
