For The Cook BANANA PUDDING

Grate a fresh coconut, pour over it a pint of milk and let cook about 20 minutes in a double boiler.

Drain in a cheese-cloth bag, pressing out all the liquid possible; return the liquid to a double boiler and stir in 1-3/4 cup of cornstarch mixed with a little cold milk to a smooth consistency; stir until the mixture thickens; add 1/2 cup of sugar and 1/2 teaspoon of salt, and mix thoroughly. Slice 4 or 5 peeled-and-scraped bananas into a buttered pudding dish, pour over them the juice of half a lemon; pour on the mixture from the double boiler and let bake about 15 minutes. Serve hot with cream and sugar.
