The organization was immediately proceeded with and completed. The following gentlemen were elected to serve as the first directors of the egg circle: Mr. Robert Buntain, President; Mr. Wm. McRae, Vice-President; Mr. J. L. Stevenson, Secretary. Other directors are Mr. John Duncan, Mr. Angus McRae, Mr. Chester Rackham, Mr. Anthony Buchanan, Mr. Kenneth Matheson and Mr. Watson Smith. Mr. T. D. Ling of Wheatley River was appointed manager, and all wishing to join the egg circle can obtain stamps and pads for stamping eggs from Mr. Ling. Wheatley River is a good egg section and doubtless this organization will prove a great success. Business will be started immediately.
