NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—President and Mrs. William H. Taft attended the wedding of the President's niece, Miss Louise Walbridge Taft, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry W. Taft, of No. 39 West Forty-sixth street, to George Hogg Snowden, a millionaire lumberman, of Seattle.
 The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Dr. Burton Howard Lee, rector of St. Mary's Protestant Episcopal Church. Owing to the recent death

of Miss Taft's aunt, Mrs. Harace Taft, of Stamford, Conn., only the members of the respective families were present.
 Miss Taft and Mr. Snowden became acquainted while he was a chum of her brother, Walbridge Taft, in Yale. Mr. Taft frequently invited Mr. Snowden to his home for the holidays and on these occasions fell in love with his prospective bride.
