

GREAT EXCITEMENT HAS BEEN CAUSED

By Announcement of Chamberlain's Resignation.

Balfour will fill up the Vacancies and Carry on the Government - Opinions of the Press on the Crisis.

CONSERVATIONS AND EXCITEMENT.

LONDON, Sept. 18.-(Special.)-Conservation and excitement has been caused by the announcement of Hon. Joseph Chamberlain's resignation and prevails among all classes of the nation.

MOST EXTRAORDINARY CRISIS.

It is said that Balfour will fill up the Government vacancies and carry on the Government until he meets parliament next year.

WHAT PUBLIC OPINION IS:

Chamberlain does not look for an immediate general election. Other rumors say that Balfour will be unable to find men who will fill the vacancies and he will be obliged to hand the King his own resignation.

WHO SUCCESSORS WILL BE:

The Westminster Gazette and other papers forecast that Lord Milner will succeed to the colonial office and the report that war Secretary Brodrick will be transferred to the India Office is probably correct.

CABINET TO MEET WITHIN A FORTNIGHT.

The New Cabinet is expected to meet within a fortnight. The prediction that the market would not be affected by the crisis is fulfilled. Consols showed a firmer tone today.

MILLS BURNED AT CRAPAUD

Grist Mill of Charles Leard Burned to the Ground - Heavy Loss.

The grist mills owned by Charles Leard about two miles from Victoria near Crapaud Corner were burned to the ground yesterday afternoon. The fire was caused by placing lumber on top of the drying kiln. The lumber ignited when the kiln was heated and the building was entirely destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$1500 to \$2000 with no insurance. Mr. Leard has only recently purchased the mills from B. D. THE GOVERNMENT DREDGE FOUNDERS
