held in \$100,000 bail on conspiracy charged with the murder of George Dietrich-Musica pleaded not guilty today before Judge William Bondy. The others entered similar pleas earlier. The fifth bogus birth certificate, McMahon said Simon told him, was for Maria Musica Girard, one of several Musica sisters. McMahon made his startling announcement a short time after Police Inspector Michael S. McDermott, in charge of Brooklyn Police, ordered a reopening of the unsolved slaying of Joseph Cohen, wealthy High and poultry dealer, and his brother Barnett, in the spring of 1932. McDermott sought to determine whether Oster-Musica had any connection with the case. Joseph Cohen spent a year in the Death House at Sing Sing following his conviction of the murder in 1914 of Barnett. The indictment was mainly on testimony procured by Oster-Musica, then an investigator for the District Attorney's Office. Cohen was deprived time and again of his freedom. The case was to be taken to the electric chair. Eventually the chief witness in the case, Joseph Sorro, admitted he had perjured himself, and he had been persuaded to testify by Oster-Musica. Cohen later was freed and Oster-Musica was indicted for subornation of perjury. The indictment was dismissed in 1929, long after Musica had become F. Donald Coeter, head of a great drug concern. chine Canal—from Victoria Bridge at the St. Lawrence River to the Dorchester Street passenger station site excavated in 1930 and 1931. A total of 4,000,000 cubic yards of earth and stone were taken from the site, 650 by 1,725 feet, and for seven years Montreal has been the area in its urban business district an "eyesore."

"The building of bridges and the station will be the second stage of the project," said Mr. Humesford. The bridges will eliminate grade crossings, permit more economical operations and provide for complete electrification of passenger trains in downtown Montreal.

The plan proposed by Sir Henry Thornton envisioned the use of the terminal as a union station by the C. N. R. and the Canadian Pacific Railway and consolidation of the use of the terminal.

"Is it intended there be joint use of the station with the C. P. R.?" Mr. Humesford was asked. "I have no comment to make about that," he replied.

"Freight traffic will not be diverted to the new terminal, but the Bonaventure passenger station built 75 years ago, will be abandoned along with St. Henri and Point St. Charles depots when the project is completed.

"We have to try to keep it respectable," Mr. Humesford replied when it was pointed out the C. N. R. Final plans include the leasing of "surface rights" to private interests for construction of office buildings, theatres or hotels over the viaduct along the railway's right-of-way, a plan like that adopted some years ago in New York and Chicago.
