Action Pictures Not So Hot

By Gayle Talbot, Associated Press Sports Writer (By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Feb. 8.—A private view of the series of action tennis pictures starring Master Frederick J. Perry, the champion, leaves some doubt of the importance of the current agitation by the British Lawn Tennis Association to make honest men out of movie-acting amateur stars.

If Perry's maiden effort is any criterion, tennis movies are not destined to rock the foundation of the industry. They are not going to swell any amateur's bank account much. They are pretty dull.

The series of 12 "lessons" which Perry gave for the benefit of the camera before he set off on his present world tour consists mainly of long and none too exciting rallies between him and Danny Maskeil, the British professional. While they are knocking the ball back and forth, Bill Tilden talks a blue streak, at times affecting the pseudo excitement of a radio announcer at a football game.

Perry, Tilden points out, does most things wrong. Instead of hitting his forehead gracefully off his left foot, as almost any good club player knows you must, the British champion smacks it off his right foot, of both feet, or with both feet in the air.

"Ha, ha, you mustn't try to do that yourself," Tilden reminds the audience after Perry has brought off one of his brilliant drives. "Only a champion can do it that way."

The audience after a time gets little bewildered, for the title of this series is "How to Play Tennis."

SPORT BRIEFS

We are rather intrigued with a suggestion of a hockey fan that we publish his selection of an all-Maritime professional team made up of former amateurs of the Big Four. His own words are: "The team that I am submitting to you could win the Stanley Cup. Of course they would need a good coach and manager." We hope that the military men of Canada and the rifle associations will make a determined effort to have the Government allow these rifles in free of duty. If so we can see a great future for rifle shooting throughout Canada.

The lessees of the Moncton Hawks Stadium paid an annual rental of \$2,500 and of course had to supply the power, etc., to run it. The 1914 pattern service rifle will be allowed for use in service rifle competition at Bixley this year. This was not put into production during the war, although it had a great many points in its favor. Some were issued to sharpshooters, these being fitted with telescopic sights. It is an accurate rifle with a very fine and strong action and has a heavier barrel than the present one. Some official tests were made early last October. Ten rifles were taken haphazard from the rack with the old fashioned 500, 600, 900 and 1000 yards. The day was an ideal one and all tests without any touching up or adjustment shot as well as the best stocked and packed small Lee Enfields. One of the men who was testing made the full score of 150 points at the 900 and 1000 yards. This is believed to be the first time such a score has been made in the Old Country.

The principal differences between it and the present rifle is in length which is two inches more, in weight which is 1 lb. 5 1/2 ozs. more. The weight of the barrel with 2 lbs. 2 1/2 ozs. as compared with the present Lee Enfield, its parts are few and very simple, bringing the price down to a level where any individual can own one.

As a matter of fact the rifle complete with target sights, etc. can be bought for less than half the cost of a complete equipment of the S. M. L. E. It can be taken straight from the rack, fitted with peep sight and magazine swivel and will then perform as well as the very best Martin or any other.
