INSURANCE CO.'S FIGHT

Vancouver, November 4.—"We believe that an examination of the auditor will elicit the fact that the deceased had no alternative but suicide. This statement was made this morning by H. E. Harris counsel for annuities company which is fighting a claim for insurance on the life of W. R. Arnold managing director of the Dominion Trust Company. During the last year of his life, Arnold insured himself for three hundred thousand dollars and today the New York Life and New York Mutual, Sovereign and Standard are fighting the endeavors of the liquidators of the Dominion Trust to make them pay. It was suggested in court this morning that the pressure brought on Arnold by Auditor Hodge was such as to result in Arnold's committing suicide, therefore there was good reason to believe he did commit suicide. Anyhow, the Insurance companies wished to have Mr. Hodge examined. The court, however, sustained the objection of J. Martin, K. C., than on certain technical grounds the insurance companies had no right to examine the auditor of the Dominion Trust Company.

HOW THE CANADIAN RED CROSS DOES ITS WORK.

In reply to numerous enquiries which are coming to Toronto Saturday night concerning the work of the Red Cross, how supplies are handled, etc., the Editor asked for an authoritative statement from the Canadian Red Cross Society, and the same follows. I would like to call your attention particularly to the last paragraph of Mrs. Plumtre's communication, denouncing the silly rumor current that the Red Cross is selling its supplies to soldiers.

Toronto, October, 1915. Editor, "Saturday Night." Dear Sir,—Mr. Noel Marshall has asked me to reply to your letter. No Canadian Red Cross Supplies, or Canadian War Contingent Association (C. W. C. A.) Supplies are sent to the War Office for distribution. (a) The Canadian Red Cross ships all its supplies to its own Commissioner, Col. C. A. Hodgetts, in London. (b) By courtesy of the Canadian Red Cross Society, the National Service Committee, the National Service Cross Society, the National Service Hospital, so that the commanding officers of the Canadian Hospitals can indent upon these supplies. Incidentally, I may remark that our latest report from our Commissioner happens to say that consignments of Red Cross Goods have been sent to every Canadian Medical Unit at the Front during the week in which he wrote. (b) By sending individual parcels to wounded Canadian soldiers, and parcels to Canadian Prisoners of War.

The field comforts are distributed (as I have stated only to the fighting Canadians in camp.) General Alderson and the commanding officers of the various battalions have made arrangements for the distribution of these field comforts in just the same way as the medical officers indent to the Red Cross supplies. There is therefore no fear that field comforts which are sent forward are either what is not needed, or that too many are sent. (3) Goods addressed to the Red Cross Society, 77 King Street E., Toronto, are carried free of charge by the Express and Railway Companies. They should be shipped (addressed as above) C. O. D., and the Society makes it right with the various Companies.

It would be very much appreciated by the Red Cross, if you could give this information in your paper, as there is still an immense amount of confusion in the public mind on the matter of Red Cross Supplies. If you would be kind enough to act on my suggestion, would you also take occasion to contradict the rumor which is coming to us from one end of Canada to the other, that the Red Cross is selling its supplies to the soldiers. Our Commissioner in England characterizes this report as "Simply Preposterous." Yours very truly, ADELAIDE M. PLUMTRE, Hon. Secretary, The Canadian Red Cross Society, Toronto.

HORSE NOTES

A resume of the racing season just closed will show that notwithstanding unusual racing conditions throughout Canada and over which races from Charlottetown to San Francisco have been well supported by the public and horsemen, while other sports have had a lean season. Permanency of the popular favor rests on clean snappy racing and always giving trotters a run for their money. But the foundation of model breeding and development and Prince Edward Island has a chance to become the Blue Grass Country of Canada if breeders will study bloodlines and breed accordingly. The next important point is the development of speed. Every colt that is bred to trot should be given the education either by a competent trainer or at home, and by exercising care and judgment considerable can be done in country districts in winter on the ice speedways. Nothing tends more to the success of racing than having country owned horses competing in the summer meets. New London which has one of the foremost Ice Racing Clubs on the Island was represented at the trots last summer with two graduates from its ranks of last winter and also the redoubtable "come back" trotter Happy George 2:29 1/2 pacer, owned and trained and driven by G. B. Harding, came from nowhere the beginning of last winter to be a top liner in the finals and the past season was a winner in three races, a strong contender in all her starts, and was separately timed in 2:21 in Charlottetown stake races.

The other was the five year old trotter Keltie 2:29 1/2 by Kalot that Walter Found had out. He took his mark in the 4th heat of a winning race at Alberton and was a sure 2:25 trotter this fall. Happy George's performance is most worthy of note because of the circumstances. While in past years he has won his share of the money, he was never quite dependable due to chronic cracked heels, and was liable to hop and go rough. His owner Wm. Toombs had decided to retire him from racing, but after winning the free-for-all on the ice in fast time without preparation, determined to try again and to take a chance with home treatment giving him no track work, depending on good care and stiff roading to get him ready. In addition he had a heavy season in the stud. His race the 2:24 stake in Charlottetown will go down in the annals of racing as one of the cleanest wins and greatest upsets of "Open" for the knowing ones never conceded him a chance, and he lowered his record two seconds in the third heat. Just to leave no doubt as to his ability he won the 2:24 race in Summerside the following week in 1:53 order.

Mrs. Pankhurst Again on War Path

NEW YORK, N. Y., Nov. 5.—A cable to The Tribune from London says: "Patriotic" anyhow the group controlled by Mrs. Pankhurst—have decided to break the truce, which has lasted since the beginning of the war, and again attack the Government, instead of supporting it. At last night's meeting in London Pavilion, Mrs. Pankhurst said they came to the decision last week and then only on account of the general impatience of the cabinet, especially regarding Serbia, which they pledged themselves to aid. Miss Annie Kenney was even more emphatic. Although the meeting was billed as "Patriotic" she remarked: "We must throw the foreign office of Asquith, Grey and Haldane. If we do not, they will betray not only Serbia but London." After more violent indictment of the Government generally and Lord Haldane especially, Miss Kenney continued: "How are they going to answer the American note? We know they are full of compromise, fear and timidity, we have got to fight for our heritage—our complete command of the seas—which they would barter away." Miss Kenney finished by describing the majority in the cabinet as "traitors," a suggestion which caused an uproar.

GERMAN AEROPLANES ATTACK BRITISH STEAMER

LONDON, Nov. 5.—Germany seems to be trying a new method of attack on British merchantmen—with aeroplanes. The Cork steamer Avocat, which has arrived at Manchester, tells a story, according to the Liverpool Journal of Commerce, of a thirty-five minutes engagement with three hostile aeroplanes, at eleven o'clock on the morning of October 30. One of the aeroplanes was a large battle-plane, which dropped thirty-six bombs, some of which missed the steamer by a narrow margin. When the Avocat's battle-plane fired on the Avocat with a machine gun. The ship's aeroplanes and decks were struck by bullets, but all the crew escaped injury. At a height of from 800 to 1,000 feet the aeroplanes dropped bombs and attacked the steamer with rifles. The Avocat's escape was due to a zig-zag manoeuvring, and the fact that the aeroplane dared not fly lower.
