FUR SALES.—Mr. Chester McClure, writing from St. Louis with reference to the price of silver fox pelts says that the entry of the United States into the war has naturally had a depressing effect upon the market. The Economy Campaign inaugurated by Mrs. Wilson has also tended to shorten sales of the best grade skins. At the same time future prospects may be gauged by the fact that speculators are endeavouring to get control of as many skins as possible. Some of these have approached Mr. McClure with offers for as many as 300 pelts and he is looking carefully into the matter. While the immediate prospect is not as bright as it was before the United States entered into the war many experienced fur men think it preferable to hold for the after-war prices rather than sell now at prices that would not be satisfactory in some cases. Cheques were received yesterday for \$900 and \$600 for single pelts which shows that the market is still open for a limited number of good pelts.

ISLANDER IN CASUALTY LIST
Mrs. Susan Ingram, 66 King street, yesterday morning received a telegram conveying the sad intelligence that her son, Private Ira Wallace Jewers, had been reported wounded, has died of his wounds. The previous despatch received stated that he had been admitted to the 13th General Hospital, Boulogne, France, April 12th, suffering from a gunshot wound in the leg. The despatch received yesterday from the Records Office by Mrs. Ingram, said: "Despily regret to inform you 712908, Private Ira Wallace Jewers, Infantry, officially reported dead of wounds, Norfolk War Hospital, Norwich, April 23, 1917." Private Jewers was employed in New Glasgow, N.S., when the war broke out. He had an excellent position as a lather there, but thought it his duty to offer his services to his country. He resigned and came home and enlisted in the 56th Battalion. He was an excellent young man and his many friends will be very sorry to learn of his death.
A telegram received yesterday brings the sad news that Frank McCormack, son of the late Mr. Angus McCormack, North St., Eleanor's was killed in action on the 19th April. He was 20 years of age and was a member of A. Company, 105th Battalion. He was drafted into the 13th and crossed to France Nov. 28th. A letter dated April 2nd had been received from him only a few days ago. He was a graduate of Prince of Wales College and taught school at Sea View previous to enlisting. There are left to mourn his mother, two brothers, O. B. and John R. and two sisters, Emma and Florence at home, who have the sincere sympathy of a wide circle of friends in the bereavement which, in common with so many others, they are called upon to endure.
Mr. John A. Murray, Clyde River received a telegram on Tuesday April 24th announcing the sad news that his son Hector had been killed in action on April 9th. He was only eighteen years of age. Hector although only

seventeen at the time of his enlisting, like countless other young men, felt it his duty on Jan. 6th, 1916 to don the khaki in defence of his country. He enlisted with the 105th P. E. Highland Regiment, but on December 5th crossed to France with a Draft from that Battalion to reinforce the 14th Battalion.
The sad news is all the more regrettable as only a month previous to his death the family were called upon to suffer the loss of his Mother. The news of which would scarcely have reached him ere he was called to lay down his life for his country.
