South Australia Has Civic Hotels - ADELAIDE, April 19 (CP) - A number of South Australian towns have gone into the hotel business and citizens are proud of their project, profits of which go toward civic benefits. Five hotels, ranging from a club to three-story residential hotels, have been set up in towns along the River Murray in the northern part of the state. All are owned and controlled by the community, which annually elects a committee of seven to administer hotel affairs. The committee appoints a hotel manager. The hotels are each in a separate town, and serve the rich fruit-growing and irrigation areas just off the border between South Australia and Victoria. The biggest is at Renmark, and its supporters claim it has been a success in every way. Accounts show that it has distributed more than \$400,000 in community benefits and makes an annual profit of about \$40,000 from bar and guest trade. Profits are devoted to hotel maintenance and improvement, civic funds and amenities in the town. Annual donations are made to local hospitals, schools, the Returned Soldiers' League and sports and other bodies. The experiment has gained country-wide publicity because it is the only one of its type in Australia which is now showing tremendous interest in reform of liquor and licence laws. A bill legalizing the liquor laws of New South Wales, which has just been passed by the state parliament, provides for the establishment of community hotels by local government bodies. And there are suggestions that similar proposals be included in the liquor laws of other states.

Manpower Surplus Italian Problem

ROME, May 19 - (CP) - More than ever before Italy today looks upon its abundant manpower—the only exportable surplus she has to dig the country out of the morass into which the war and 20 years of Fascism have plunged it.

Stunning and the tourist trade which once helped balance Italy's budget are gone. The number of unemployed is estimated at 3,000,000. More than half are unskilled laborers. Agriculture's ability to absorb them has been lessened because many fields still are mined or covered with war-proving castorbeans.

The ministry of labor is working for outside help to draw off manpower. This can come chiefly in two forms: 1—Emigration about which the Italian government has hopes, but no delusions. 2—Specific contracts whereby Italy can process other countries' raw materials, paying for them with labor.

Rome's Voice Republicans said that the spirit in Italy today is such that "15 million men would willingly leave tomorrow for any part of the globe to escape Fascism. It is a theme recently when he gave a group of Americans a private audience among her dignitaries, United States ambassador of immigration. The pontiff expressed hope that gates would be opened to immigrants, saying "immigration could help solve Europe's saddest problem."

South America Silent - But while officials at the ministry of labor have hopes, there are, as yet, few results. No word of a welcome for Italian workers has been received by the Italian government from South American countries, including Brazil and Peru.

There are, however, hopes that requests for Italian workers will be made and that doors will be opened to immigrants, especially in South America, Belgium, France, Spain and perhaps England.

Negotiations with France for 20,000 miners to dig coal that France desperately needs are stalled because of France's ruling to protect its own currency, that none of the earnings of the miners shall be sent back to their families in Italy.

The Italian press is carrying almost daily articles of arrangements whereby British wool and cotton, Swedish wool and other raw materials will be worked by Italian firms, returning in payment part of the processed goods. Circles close to the ministry of labor have said that the only contract thus far negotiated is with Norway, whereby the country supplies wool and cotton for Italy to process and pays for the processed goods with cotton.

There is considerable interest on the part of private foreign capital in Italian labor, which is a bargain on the international labor market. For example, an Italian workman today receives an average of \$22 to \$44 monthly. On the other hand, it is planned that foreign capital eventually will operate some Italian industries.

Food imports are important, say labor circles here, but until the Italian labor has a chance to work, Italy will not be able to begin walking the road to recovery.

Floating Airstrip Invented In India - NEW DELHI, India, May 19 - (CP) - The floating airstrip, a wartime discovery of great potential value to peace-time aviation, is the direct development of an experiment carried out years ago by a young sapper officer in India. The test began at the headquarters of King George V's Own Bangalore Sappers and Miners when Capt. D. W. R. Walker, designed a bridge of floating planks, laid across a deep, swiftly-flowing canal. It was able to take the weight of a moving vehicle, was advanced a stage further in 1939 with the incorporation of canvas in its design. Vehicles could stop in midstream. By 1941, it had been adopted for use by the Indian Army.

It was not until 1944 that the principle was successfully applied to aircraft. The young sapper, now Col. Walker, R. E., and his plans were rigorously tested by the Royal Engineers and the Royal Navy at Lamlash on the River Clyde, Scotland. Not only did "glowers," as the "floating airstrip" was called, enable aircraft to take off and land on water, but its sturdy design enabled it to withstand the roughest conditions.

Milk Dealers At Summerside Form Association

A meeting of the milk dealers and distributors of Summerside was held on Saturday evening and an organization to be known as the Milk Dealers, Producers and Distributors Association was formed. Mr. Ernest Walker was elected president and Mr. Elmer Oker, proprietor of the Ideal Dairy was elected secretary-treasurer.

The main objective of the new organization will be to work cooperatively for the welfare of the industry and better service to the public. A representative of the consumers will be added to the board at a later date.

A number of matters pertaining to the industry were discussed, particularly the termination by the Saturday Convention Institute secured a large number of memberships among the residents of French River.

Following the successful campaigns in Charlottetown and Summerside the Women's Institutes of Prince Edward Island are conducting the cancer campaign in their respective districts. They have undertaken the drive to secure memberships for the Canadian Cancer Society with the same enterprise and enthusiasm which has characterized their efforts previously in the interests of public health.

Many Institutes have sent in for more literature and receipt books as they find the response to the appeal for memberships in the Cancer Society greater than they anticipated. In addition to securing membership the W. I. campaign serves the purpose of distributing literature to educate the people to the hopeful fact that cancer can be cured—that cancer is the most curable of all major diseases, if caught in its early stages.

The Women's Institute Cancer Campaign will be completed this month and if the present enthusiasm continues it is believed that the P.E.I. Women's Institutes will have achieved another splendid achievement.

Hon. Dr. MacMillan states that all money received in membership fees will be spent in the purchase of a new building for the Cancer Society in Charlottetown. He says further that the membership drive is the first step in the fight against cancer in Prince Edward Island—the full program including education, treatment and research.

Such organizations as the South African Council of Trades and Labor and the National Council of Women argue that the population of the cities is sufficiently literate to make administration of rationing a success and urge its introduction to regulate distribution and curb growing shortages.

Results of hoarding and boarding houses do fairly well—a married couple can live in a hotelroom with food, linen and service for 20 pounds a month (about \$20 a week)—but the lower income householders, particularly the natives and other depressed classes, are unable to meet nutritional requirements.

Corn and wheat are in short supply. Corn is expected to become scarce in a few months. While prices have approximately doubled since before the war they still compare favorably with Canadian prices. The most expensive cuts of beef cost 1s. 2d. (24 cents) a pound, compared with 7d. or 8d. before the war. Lamb chops are 1s. 6d. a pound and bacon sells at 1s. 3d. to 2s. 3d., with all grades fairly plentiful.

Butter, cheese and fat products, particularly soap, are scarce. An order just issued allows bakers 50 per cent of their restricted quota of sifted meal to make meat pies, sausage rolls and fruit buns, eaten mainly by the lower income groups. Sugar is short, and manufacture of all confectionery has been banned. Imported Canadian coffee is selling well at 2s. 6d. a pound.
