Majority for Union in Fifty Per Cent of the Presbyteries

TORONTO, Dec. 16.—According to figures compiled by the Church authorities here, fifty per cent. of the Presbyteries of the Presbyterian Church in Canada have given a majority vote for Union with the Methodist and Congregational Churches. The vote was: For, 75,472; against, 52,402. The number of congregations giving this vote was 993, of which 618 gave majorities for Union.

LONDON NOW READY FOR ZEPPELINS.

LONDON, Dec. 16.—Elaborate preparations for the protection of London from German raids, which have been undergoing radical changes in the last three months, are now virtually completed. The plan of defence worked out by Sir Percy Scott is perfected to such an extent that he has been able to turn over the responsibility to the War Office. It is learned from an un-qualified authority that the reason Scott retired is that he has finished work on the system he inaugurated, which is now in full swing.

It has been intended that the army should take over its control as soon as possible. That time has come quicker than was expected, although it has been evident that the sweeping changes brought about by Scott were going on rapidly.

When he assumed charge in September, he at once began the installation of a type of gun his experience as a leading gunnery expert in the British navy told him was suitable, although Sir Balfour expressed surprise. The situation to-day is, according to the information obtained, that a gun searchlight system has been brought to a proper degree of efficiency ready for all future raids. The naval gunners have been replaced by army experts, who have distinguished themselves by anti-aircraft work at the front. These men have been shooting at aeroplanes and airships for more than a year and have had much more practice than naval men. Therefore there seems to be a comfortable feeling that any further attempts on the part of Zeppelins to attack London are likely to be unsuccessful.
