MAN DROWNED AT ST. JOHN, N.B.

Gallant Attempt Made at Rescue by Noted Life Saver.

Martin Burns, a spectator, gallantly jumped twenty-five feet to his rescue but although he brought McCarthy ashore, efforts to resuscitate him were unavailing.
