The bride was attired in blue broad-cloth with hat to match. She was attended by her cousin Miss Mary Blaquier while the groom was supported by Mr. John Gohell of Georgetown. The happy couple left on the afternoon train for their future home in Georgetown.

MUST BE STOPPED.—The attention of the Civic Authorities is again called to the continued riding of Bicycles on the sidewalk of Brighton Road, yesterday afternoon a young child was almost run down. He was on the scaffolding 35 feet up when in some accountable way he fell to the ground. He was taken at once to the City Hospital. The extent of his injuries could not be ascertained at a late hour last night, except that his condition was regarded as very serious.

FARMERS' PICNIC.—There will be another farmers' picnic, to the Experimental Farm today. The members of Central, Lot 16, Farmers' Institute will comprise the visiting party, and they will be about 75 in number. They will arrive in the city about ten o'clock. While they are on the Farm, it is arranged for the automobiles to go out there and take the picnickers for drives. At three o'clock in the afternoon, fifty of the teachers attending the Summer School will, under the guidance of Professor Reid, visit the farm while the picnic is on.

The lecture and the show were conducted at fresco on the open grounds of the Prince Street School and there were three or four hundred present, four-fifths of whom were children. Great interest was manifested in the views depicted, which were 50 in number, showing public playgrounds, baths and wading pools for children in other countries. Mr. Reilly emphasized the opportunity that the summer holidays now present for a start being made in this city in the direction of providing a public playground for children, under proper organization and control, by a practical demonstration on these grounds during the next month.

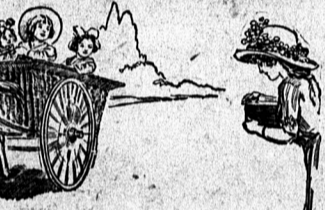
