PRINCE HONORS SIR W. GRENFELL

LONDON, Nov. 5.—(By the Canadian Press)—The Prince of Wales paid a tribute to the work of Sir Wilfred Grenfell in a letter which was read by the Lord Mayor of London recently at a meeting at the Mansion House in support of the Grenfell Association. The letter read: "There is no doubt that Sir Wilfred is carrying on splendid work in a territory rapidly becoming an economic unit of great potential value to Newfoundland and the Empire." Speaking of the potential value of Labrador, Sir Wilfred Grenfell said: "Labrador, once looked upon as a useless dump-heap of the world, has a fall twice the height of Niagara. All this power is going to waste. Modern scientists say that God wastes no energy or matter. How then can we say this great land is of no value? If we do not realize it is no dump-heap somebody else will. I think that is already being found out."

Field Marshal Viscount Allenby

said that a letter bearing the only address, "Grenfell, of God knows where," was safely delivered to Sir Wilfred at Labrador.

CAPTAIN HENRY SQUAREBRIGGS

On Sunday, Oct. 26th, Capt. Henry Squarebriggs passed to his rest at the age of 90. The deceased, the son of Henry Squarebriggs and his wife Catherine McLeod, was born in New London, P.E.I., on Jan. 1, 1840. 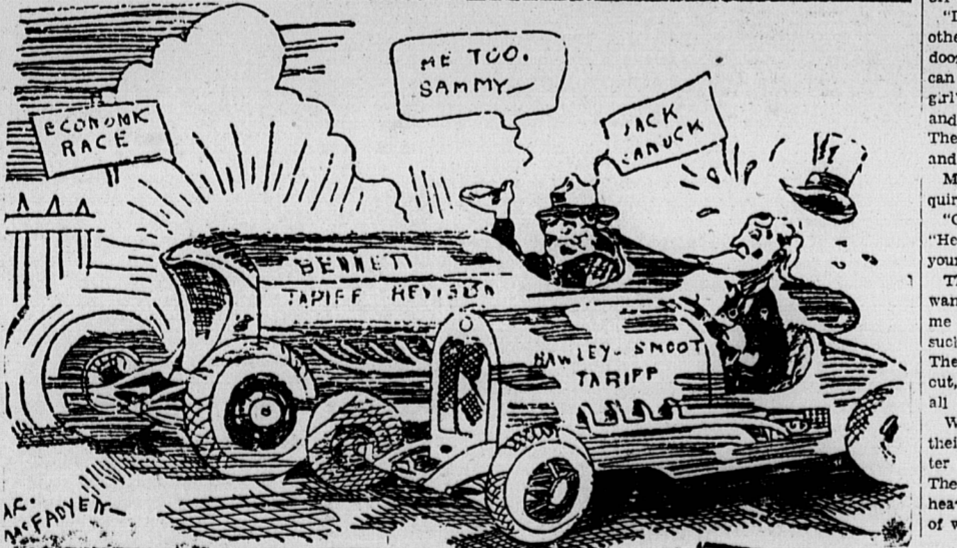
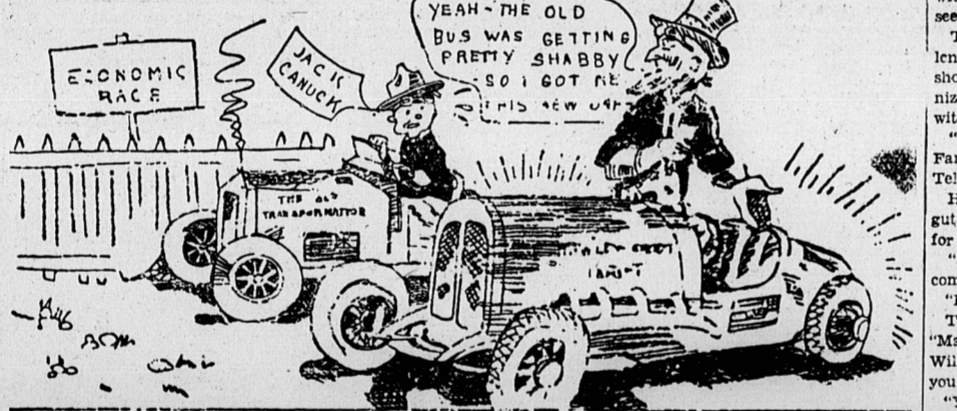
When quite a young man Capt. Squarebriggs was converted and joined the Methodist Church at Stanley Bridge, where he filled very acceptably the offices of trustee and steward. Prior to his death he was a member of the United Church of Dundas. Capt. Squarebriggs possessed those qualities, which made him a good husband, father, and friend, being held in high esteem by all who knew him. Always appreciative, kindly and courteous, he endeavored to live a true and consistent christian life.

The funeral service was held at the home of Mr. J. A. Sterns, Bridgetown, on Tuesday, Oct. 28th at 11 a. m. The hymns sung were special favorites of the Captain. "The great Physician now is near," "Simply trusting every day," and "Jesus is tenderly calling today," the latter being sung as a solo by Mr. Herbert McLeod. Special reference was made to Psalm 107, 30, as most appropriate.

After the service in the home, which was largely attended, the remains were taken to the People's Cemetery, Charlottetown, where interment took place.

The deceased is survived by five sons, John T. of Everett, Mass.; Major Wm. H. of Toronto, Ont.; J. Herbert of Waltham, Mass.; Richard B. of Toronto; Sandie S. of Regina, Sask.; and one daughter, Mrs. John A. Sterns, of Bridgetown, P.E.I. One son, Ensign Charles H., died in Toronto in March, 1928.


