GERMAN SHELTERS FILLED WITH DEAD

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

PARIS.—Several lines of German trenches in Champagne, near Moronvilliers, were captured last night by the French, the War Office announced. The French took eight hundred prisoners and found wrecked German shelters filled with dead. The Germans lost heavily in ineffectual counter-attacks.

Sunday spoke to an audience of 4,000 persons in the afternoon, and hit the trail. Here are some of the points handed out by the evangelist to his afternoon audience.

"If we were real Christians, we would not get moved around on the checkerboard of life so often, and that God-forsaken gang, Congress, would get up and do something."

Many preachers are like some physicians—long on diagnosis and short on therapeutics. Some serious, instead of being a bugle call for service, are nothing but showers of spiritual cocaine."

Sunday said he had no use for moral snobs, and that the teachers of the Pharisees were four flushers.

"You night as well expect me to cry 'Hoch der Kaiser,' as to preach about truly solemn old, 'Kopoi' in the social religion of the Pharisees church people is that they go to church on Sunday and to hell on the other six days of the week," he said.

FRANCE GLORIFIED IS SUNDAY'S THEME

NEW YORK.—France, glorified by war, was held illustrating the heights to which a nation can attain while 19,000 in the big tabernacle cheered, and cheered and then began all over again. The climax of the Sunday address came when the evangelist, lifting his clenched fists above his head, bellowed out with "Oh, God, how France can fight!" The storm of applause began again.

A majority of those who listened to the evangelist were women and among the audience were several thousand school teachers. At the close 1,636 journeyed down the saw dust trail to take Sunday's hand.

Sunday preached on "Is it well with thee?" and it was as a sort of aside from the thread of his discourse that he spoke of France. He said that Americans who went to Paris saw the cabarets, the high kicking, the painted women, the tawdry ornaments, and the bright lights, and they came to believe that France was frivolous, effeminate, and degraded. When the war came they found out that Paris was not the heart of France, and that in that land there were thousands of godly parents raising godly children. In an interval in the applause he enquired of the men and the women of France who are now serving their country.

"The people of the United States have heard of the bright lights of New York," he continued. "They have seen only the night life through the bleary eyes of the Tenderloin; they have seen the women who revel there and the men who frequent the cabarets, and they have heard of the lounge lizards. They have sight of the thousands of godly parents who are rearing their children on Manhattan. Real New York is not reflected in the white lights of the Tenderloin or the tawdry glitter of the cabarets. Real New York is reflected in the multitude who rush to this tabernacle and rush down the aisle, moaning and groaning to fall in the arms of Jesus."

Billy told several pathetic stories in illustrating his points and the crying in the audience was noticeable. He scored parents who do not bring up their children in the way they should go and who realize and warn them when it is top late.

"Yes," he said, "you wait too long. You wait until he curses you to your face before you teach him 'Thou shalt not take the name of God in vain.' You wait until he staggers into your presence before you teach him 'Look not on the wine when it is red.' You wait until he steals and is off for the penitentiary before you teach him 'Thou shalt not steal.' You wait until he has robbed some girl of her virtue before you teach him 'Thou shalt not commit adultery.' You wait too long."

There was a laugh when Billy said that many a "frizzly haired little sissy," knows more than her grandmother. "Why, they know it before they get on long skirts," then Sunday paused in his race up and down the platform, and added: "You can't tell by their skirts these days. Some of the old dames wear them short. They get my goat. No wonder the dogs turn out better than kids."

"Go home," and he banged his hand on his chest and look in the mirror, and say, 'There is the old lobster who is to blame.' There are a lot of prominent men and women in New York who, if they died tonight, would not have to look in the obituary notices in the newspapers to know where they had gone."


