JAMES GAMBLE DIES IN ORISKA, NORTH DAKOTA

James Gamble, well-known blacksmith since 1886 in Oriska, passed from this life on April 29, 1949, at Mercy Hospital in Valley City. About two years ago he suffered a stroke of paralysis, and since that time has been in failing health. He received the best of hospital care during recent weeks, and was able to return to his home in Tower City; but a weakened heart added to his troubles and he was brought again to the hospital. His strength gradually ebbed away until the end came. His age was 64 years, 2 months, 1 day.

James Thomas Gamble, son of William Lorenzo Gamble and Sara Quigley Gamble, was born February 26, 1886, at Mt. Tyrone, Prince Edward Island, Canada. As a young man of 17 years he came to Fargo, North Dakota, where he worked in the railroad shops for three years. In 1888 he came to Oriska and began his work as a blacksmith, which he continued for 59 years, retiring in 1944, and making his home with his daughter, Mrs. Ed Griffin, Tower City. In this long and faithful life, he made many friends and contributed greatly to the up-building of his community. He was a fine workman and an upright citizen, a good neighbor and friend.

On May 27, 1891, he was united in marriage with Miss Olive Ellen Hampton of Oriska, and the union thus lasted for over 52 years. The Golden Wedding celebration in 1941 is an event still

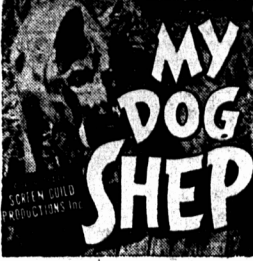

FURY AT FURNACE CREEK AT CAPITOL, SUMMERSIDE
