DOG SMUGGLING BY AIRPLANE

LONDON, Aug. 1.—Dog smuggling by airplane has arrested the interest of the House of Lords, which recently devoted part of an afternoon to a discussion of the subject. The pampered toy dog was their iordships, Lord Lilongby de Broke supporting Lord Bedleslow in a demand that "such useless brutes" be excluded from the country.

It was pointed out that it is an easy task for a person to smuggle the small lap dog into the country in a muff or basket. The ministry of agriculture promised to renew its vigilance in the matter of preventing dog smuggling to increase the penalties if necessary.

DOG DIES; FOLLOWED MASTER TO WAR FRONT

LONDON, Aug. 1.—Prince, who was one of the most famous dogs in the world war, has just died at the home in Stafford of the family of his master, whom he tracked to the battle front in France.

Private Brown of the Staffordshire regiment was ordered abroad in 1914 and left his Irish terrier behind him. A few days after he left home Prince was missed and a fortnight later, he, in some unexpected manner, arrived in the trenches near Arras, where he found his master.

After several months at the front Private Brown was wounded and went into the rear areas and the dog was sent home.

THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, July 29.—Evidence of the firmer undertone which has developed in the egg market in the past few days was to be found in yesterday's trading although quotations for the day did not change materially. Inquiries are still being made from abroad, but prices offered are considered more or less out of line of 23c to 24c for fresh firsts prompt shipment. Receipts of eggs at Montreal yesterday were 1,157 cases as compared with 1,711 cases on Thursday of last week, and 2,752 cases on the corresponding day last year.

We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows: Specials 43c. to 44c. Extras 40c. to 41c. No. 1 candied stock 34c. to 35c. No. 2 candied stock 31c. to 32c.

Midsummer dullness still grips the trade in maple products, prices remaining nominally unchanged maple syrup being quoted at \$1.50 per tin of one gallon, and maple sugar at 15c. to 17c. per pound according to quality.

New crop potatoes continue to dominate the potato market, there being a steady demand for them in small lots a \$2.75 per 100 pounds in a wholesale way. Trade in old crop stock is dull.

STRAATHROY, Ont., Aug. 1.—Mrs. Herbert Greenfield, wife of Alberta's newly chosen premier, who is visiting here, heard this morning with undisguised pleasure of her husband's selection as head of the farmer government of the western province.

Mrs. Greenfield was visiting friends of her girlhood in days in Adelaide township when a telegram from Mr. Greenfield arrived here to tell her of the event. She expressed the greatest delight. "It is almost too good to be true," she remarked. "I am not altogether surprised. We had considered it as a possibility, but it is none the less pleasant news; for all that."

Mrs. Greenfield is a pretty little woman of about 48, of decidedly jolly disposition. People in Strathroy and the surrounding country who knew her when she was Miss Elizabeth Harris, at the time when Herbert Greenfield had just come out from England to take up farming, says she has not changed a bit. They also remember Mr. Greenfield as a jovial soul and recall that he used to have a decidedly pleasing voice and a reputation as a singer.

"I can hardly realize what it means yet. I really can't say anything," Mrs. Greenfield said this morning. Asked as to how she would like the idea of leaving the farm and going to live at the provincial capital, she repeated it was too big a thing for her to realize.

CALGARY, July 30, 1921.—The funeral of the late Dr. Harry P. Wright, which took place from his home to the Central Methodist Church last Wednesday, afternoon was under the supervision and direction of Perfection Lodge, A. O. U. W. and was attended by a large number of his friends and relatives.

The late Dr. H. P. Wright is a native of Prince Edward Island and has resided in Calgary for the last fifteen years. He was a brother of Dr. Frank Wright of Vancouver, formerly of Calgary. He is survived by his widow and one son, Gordon and a sister, Maud Wright, also of P. E. Island. The deceased was well known in the Island and the news of his death will be received with many regrets by his large circle of friends and relatives who are still living on the Island. The funeral service were attended by many former residents of the Island, among whom were Mr. and Mrs. D. A. MacLeod, Mr. and Mrs. J. T. McDonald, Dr. H. W. Wright, Dr. Coffin, the Misses Sadie and Gertrude MacDonald, sisters of Mrs. D. A. MacLeod, Mrs. B. F. Dingman and many others.

While he was a resident in the West, the late Dr. Wright had built up an exceptionally large practice and he leaves behind him as large a circle of friends as any one could wish. He was extremely popular among his co-workers and with his office staff and was a prominent member of many of the best clubs.

EXCHANGE RATE IS HURTFUL TO SWISS

BERNE, Aug. 1.—At a public meeting of persons interested in commerce and industry held in the Swiss capital it was stated that unless exchange could somehow be made normal, or more normal, and the high value of the Swiss franc lowered in comparison with the money of all other countries, except the United States, Swiss trade and industry would ultimately be ruined. One Swiss speaker quoted a German commercial magnate as having just said in Berne: "We are sorry, but we Germans will ruin Switzerland commercially." The speaker explained that this did not mean that Germany was deliberately laying herself out to ruin Switzerland commercially, but that German could sell many articles of every day use four or five times cheaper than in Switzerland. Even the hotel industry, which is one of the principal Swiss industries is feeling the competition of Germany. Thus in Berne, alone, this month, 2,500 Swiss have been passports vized at the German consulate for spending a holiday in German summer resorts. For eight Swiss francs or even less they receive 100 German marks, and they can live in good hotels in the Black Forest for about twenty-five marks daily, which is equal to about two Swiss francs, whereas, one cannot get hotel accommodation for the simplest Swiss hotels for less than fifteen francs a day at about the same time. ists in Germany now than in Switzerland, which is also attributed to the low value of German money. Americans are staying in the Black Forest hotels pay barely half a dollar daily which includes a good bedroom and the three principal meals.

Similarly the cost of railway travel in Germany is about one quarter of what it is in Switzerland. One speaker at this public meeting in Berne exclaimed: "The high value of our money will be the ruin of our country."

NO CLUE YET AS TO WHERE SPURGIN IS

CHICAGO, Aug. 1.—Discovery of a \$450,000 leather speculation of Warren C. Spurgin, missing president of the closed Michigan Avenue Trust Company, was reported today by the state attorney's office. The leather, it was stated, was found in the warehouse of a local wholesale leather dealer and was in Spurgin's name. An effort will be made to list it among the assets of the missing banker, it was stated. With indictments out and a search for Spurgin leading from Canada to Mexico, a second discovery was announced today by the state attorney's office whose operatives have found an apparent plot to tunnel into the building of the defunct bank. A hole six feet square and four feet deep was discovered just outside the wall of the vault, it was stated. Mrs. Spurgin and her daughter, Vivian, who returned here from Detroit, have been released after close questioning by state's attorneys. W. C. Burns, Chicago, representative of Libby's, which carried a \$100,000 policy on the bank, said today that his best tip so far was from Montreal. He has detectives Mobile, and New York, he said. An informative man from a day-by the state attorney's office closely with Spurgin's and discovered the man had come from Detroit, Mr. Burns said.
