MILLION DOLLAR CHURCH CONFRAT.

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—Trustees of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, it was announced today, have signed contracts with architects of Boston for construction plans and designs for the building of the nave of the Cathedral. The entire cost, it was said, will be more than \$1,000,000. The contracts signed do not include any exterior decoration or involve the building of the two large transept towers or the four towers to be placed at each corner of the nave proper. The nave of the cathedral will be 170 feet high and about 240 feet long and constructed of Peekskill granite.

Keep the Canadian dollar at home is very much a matter of the wholesale dealer who buys a car and sells it. No matter what retailers and individual consumers may desire to do as a national self-interest campaign, the jobber is the man who very often controls the situation. The wholesaler has a wide-angle vision. He has customers for and wide; not in one province but in many. His parish is often as large as that of the manufacturer. His business has a national scope. To the wholesaler the general welfare of Canada is of more direct importance than it is to the retailer or the individual.

Naturally this country looks to the wholesaler to help along the Made in Canada movement because it is going to be in his best interests to offer the retailer the goods his customers are demanding and in his position of buying in carloads lots he can do a great deal to help or hinder people in carrying out the Made in Canada sentiment. The wholesaler who buys his goods from a foreign country is letting the reservoir leak without pumping into it. Every carload of goods bought outside of Canada means the value of a carload taken away from the purchasing power of the Canadian factories quite as much as on the proceeds of Canadian farms and mines and fisheries.

We all realize the insanity of killing the goose that lays the golden egg. The golden egg in this case is the ability of the Canadian people to buy goods, and the ability of the Canadian manufacturers to supply them as well if not better, as cheaply if not more cheaply, than any other nation now competing for business.

ENEMY SUBJECTS AT PETAWAWA WORKING.

OTTAWA, Jan. 2.—General Sir Wilfrid Otter, who has charge of the interned Austrians and Germans, now has 450 of them at Petawawa, where they are engaged in converting some of the buildings which were only used for summer camp quarters into winter quarters, and also in cutting down some of the timber which requires to be removed from the camp area. At the site of the new experimental farm near Hearst, Ont., 170 men are employed. They have erected seven log bunkhouses and a dining hall, and are now starting the work of clearing the bush. Representatives are present from the Ontario Agricultural College to direct the work. A Christmas was kept as a holiday at both these camps, and the men enjoyed extra rations.

The site of the Experimental farm on the N. T. R. in Quebec will be cleared in a day or two, and a band of men will be sent up at once. They will go by way of Cochrane, as it would be too expensive to keep the line open from Quebec west. For the same reason no men will be sent up to parent at present to work for the Quebec Water Powers Commission, who wanted a roadway cut through the bush.

NEW YEAR MESSAGES FROM CANADIANS.

LONDON, Jan. 2.—The weekly paper "Canada" published here, has received several New Year Messages from Dominion statesmen. The Hon. Dr. Roche speaks of Canada's grim determination to aid in crushing the harmful spirit of chimerical supremacy which deliberately brushed aside all overtures for peace and which soared beyond the pale of reason. Western Canada will furnish annually two hundred million bushels of wheat to the Motherland.

Hon. George Perley says the war incidentally will make stronger the British Empire and its various component parts. "We must all get to know each other better by fighting side by side, and realize more fully the good points of our friends living thousands of miles away. We are getting a truer perspective, and many new points of view, so that we shall be better able to solve in a reasonable and mutually satisfactory way any Empire problems that may arise. So shall the Kaiser's aggression help to consolidate the great British Empire." Premier Hearst says: "Our confidence in the Empire and our own country is unbounded, our outlook for the future is an inspiration to all that energy and patriotism can accomplish." Saskatchewan Premier declares the province faces the future full of hope and patriotic energy. Sir Edmund Walker says: "We face the new year earnestly, hoping the war will soon end, but more convinced than ever of our duty to England at this hour."

QUEEN ALEXANDRA'S NEW YEAR MESSAGE TO WOMEN OF EMPIRE.

LONDON, Dec. 31.—Queen Alexandra sends through "The Gentlewoman" the following New Year's message to the women of the Empire, and especially those who are mourning the loss of loved ones in the war: "I send to the women of the Empire at this great crisis in our history a message of hope and consolation for New Year. You will have been through a great period of suffering by the loss of dear ones, and many more sacrifices will yet be demanded of you, but I feel that they will be borne with that patience and fortitude which have supported and sustained you throughout the last five terrible months. "You have suffered in a great and just cause, and my earnest prayer is that in your sorrow you may be consoled by the thought that those who are near and dear to you have died like heroes for their king and country." "May God pour His infinite blessings upon you in whatever calamities you are called upon to bear until the blessings of peace once more dawn upon us."

DRCP IN INCOME DESPITE WAR TAX.

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 2.—A drop of \$363,000 in the excise duties for the month of November, in spite of the higher duties imposed on liquors and tobacco as a war tax, shows that there has been a very great reduction in the consumption of these articles. The Inland Revenue Department received \$1,603,676 during November 1914, against \$1,965,583 for November, 1913.
