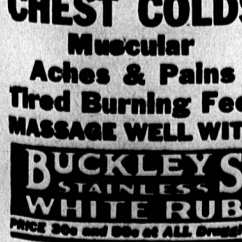

4 tablespoons mild-flavoured fat
1 1/2 cup brown sugar
1 egg yolk
1 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/2 slightly beaten egg white
1 1/2 cup crushed corn or wheat
flakes

1 1/4 cups pastry flour or
1 cup plus 2 tablespoons all
purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1-2 teaspoon salt
1 1/4 cup chopped raisins
1 1/2 slightly beaten egg white
1 1/2 cup crushed corn or wheat
flakes

1 1/2 cups cream fat, gradually blend in
brown sugar, then egg yolk, vani-
lla and mixed peel. Sift flour,
baking powder and salt and stir
in. Add raisins and combine well.
Roll small pieces of dough into
balls, dip in slightly beaten egg
white and roll in crushed corn or
wheat flakes. Place on a greased
baking sheet and, using a thimble
or fingertip make a deep depres-
sion in the centre of each ball.
Bake in a slow oven, 325 degrees,
F. 20 to 25 minutes. Fill depres-
sions with jelly or jam. Makes 15
to 18 small cakes.
