WESTVILLE AND ABEGWEITS  
DEADLOCKE D IN 2-2 SCORE

Finest Ball Witnessed on Local Diamond  
This Season—Locals Surprise Fans  
With Splendid and Air-Tight Ball in  
Pinches—Second Game Today at 1.30  
Sharp—Great Ball Expected.

Westville 2; Abegweits 2

Upwards of one thousand cheering, well-pleased and wildly excited ball followers saw the invading Westville nine from across the Strait knuckle down to the Abegweits last evening in the eighth and ninth inning of a heart-breaking tilt; the locals coming through with two runs to snatch victory from under the visitors' noses and earn an even break.

It was the best game of ball witnessed on the Abegweit diamond this season, both aggregations going at top speed throughout, and but for one or two costly errors the clash was well nigh perfect. Every game of ball, especially with a low count and a threatening extra inning to decide the verdict, has its features. There were a number of them last evening, scintillating over all was the wonderful running catch by McIsaac in deep centre of Francis' terrific smash.

Other features of the game were D. McWilliam's spectacular catch of McEachern's foul in the sixth; McEachern's one thousand per cent work on the defence, handling four teen chances for eight put outs and six assists; also his beating the throw to the plate from second base on Bill Ryan's short double to centre. This was the Abegweit first score and came in the eighth. Bill McDonald's wicked drive to centre scoring Williams in the ninth may also be recorded; not forgetting the splendid feinting of Ryan in right field.

"Lefty" McQuaid on the slab for the locals last evening had a wonderful catch in right field, while B. Williams, husky right hander for the visitors, Williams was within himself all the while and hurled masterly ball throughout the set-to. McQuaid on the other hand never had better control and but for the old hit the full course was a pitcher's battle with the wreaths about even.

How the Runs Were Made  
J. Dunbar opened the fourth with a single to centre, but is forced at second on a bingle off Corrigan's bat. However Lynds' fumble and overthrow of McIsaac's endeavor enabled Corrigan to chalk up the first score.

A double by McMillan and a single by B. Dunbar in the seventh counted for the second run. The locals' run came in the eighth and ninth when McEachern beats out a hit to first, steals second on an overthrow and crosses the rubber on Ryan's short double. With two down in the ninth the Abegweits tie the score, Williams running for McQuaid, crosses the plate on McDonald's single to deep centre. This is the run-getting story of one of the best local games the writer has witnessed in a long while.

In conversation with a number of the Westville ball players shortly after the game, they stated that the brand was the hardest they have had to fight this year. In fact, they added it was a better exhibition of ball in comparison with any played so far in the Pictou County League this year. It may be added the visitors like McQuaid's style and find him hard to hit safely especially with runners on the paths.

If last night's game was a thrill for this afternoon's contest is certain to be equally if not better ball. The tilt starts at 1.30 sharp to enable the Westville boys to finish their engagement here and reach the Hochelaga which leaves at 4 o'clock on return home. In all likelihood Manager Dougan will either start "Putty" Connors or Hobbs on the mound today against the Nova Scotians who undoubtedly will be seeking at least one scalp to carry to their wigwam tomorrow evening. The Abegweits however are determined to hold off if not take the Westvillites in camp. At all events this afternoon's game has the earmarks of a hectic contest.

The Game by Innings  
First Inning—B. Dunbar out to McEachern; Oliver follows hitting to Diamond and is safe on the latter's error. J. Dunbar singles to left field advancing Oliver to second, who steals third on passed ball to catcher. A score looks imminent, but is thwarted when McQuaid holds Marshall to a pop fly and strikes out Corrigan the fifth batter.

Abbies—McEachern grounds out to Williams. Bill Ryan is more lucky and is safe on Darrach's tumble of a drive to short. Ryan gets Carey fly out to McIsaac in centre, and Francis pops out to J. Dunbar at first. No scoring.  
Second Inning—McQuaid works McIsaac on three pitched balls; McMillan is thrown out at first by McEachern. The side is retired when Darrach is thrown out by McQuaid.

Abbies—McQuaid drives a fast one at Darrach who handles nicely for an out. Lynds beats Oliver's fumble of a drive to second and is safe. Bill McDonald tries hard for a hit to deep centre but fails when McIsaac makes a good catch. Diamond comes through with the Abbies' first hit by doubling to left field, advancing Lynds to third. He fails to score however, Oliver throwing Cronin at first for the third out. No scoring.

Third Inning, Westville. The local clan make short work of this half, the three first batters going out in order. Williams and B. Dunbar going out to McEachern on ground balls and Oliver bends to McDonald on a hard fly to centre. Abbies—Both teams were maintaining errorless and spectacular ball in these innings. Westville came back strong in this half by duplicating the town stunt. McEachern out to Williams; Bill Ryan out to Darrach; McCarey struck out. No scoring.

Fourth Inning, Westville—J. Dunbar started the "ball" rolling on a single to centre. Marshall flies out to Lynds, who handles Corrigan's hit for a force out of Dunbar at second. Lynds seemed to be the target for batted balls in this inning. McIsaac cracks under the strain and fumbles and hurriedly overthrows to second to stop Corrigan, the latter scoring on the error. Further scoring is stopped when Bill Ryan makes a great catch of McMillan's fly to long right field.

Abbies—The Abegweits again go down in order, this time by the strike-out route; Francis, McQuaid, and Lynds failing to connect with Williams' delivery. Score, Westville 1; Abbies 0.

Fifth Inning, Westville—Goes down in order, J. Darrach by the one, two, three route; Williams gives Ryan a chance to make a wonderful catch in right field, while B. Dunbar is out to McEachern on a hard "Texas" fly.  
Abbies—W. McDonald out to J. Dunbar—a race for the sack; Diamond out to Darrach; Cronin out to Corrigan at third. Score, Westville 1; Abbie, 0.

Sixth Inning, Westville;—Oliver flies safely to centre; J. Dunbar fans, followed by Marshall; Corrigan singles to short right field advancing Oliver to third. The side goes to rest when McIsaac plants a hot line drive at Diamond.

Abbies—McEachern fouls out to McWilliams a wonderful running catch; Bill Ryan flies to short left, but loses the advantage, being caught stealing second. McCarey fans. Score, Westville 1; Abbies 0.

Seventh Inning—R. McMillan doubles nicely to left; B. Dunbar singles to centre scoring McMillan for the visitors second and last count. Oliver hits to Lynds but is safe on Ed's error. J. Dunbar bunts perfectly to advance Oliver—both safe. With the bases full Marshall poles a long drive to deep centre, and another feature of the game committed above, takes place when Bill McDonald pulls down said drive and throws accurately to the plate to stop McMillan on the attempted sacrifice. It was a wonderful hoave and expertly landed by Francis the Abbie backstop.

McEachern ends the threatening rally by hauling down Corrigan's difficult fly back of deep centre.  
Abbies—Francis bingles out to Williams; McQuaid is worked for a strike out by same moundsman. Lynds raises the hopes of the home towners by doubling to left field but dies on the path when McDonald is thrown out by Williams the fast and one of the best fielding hurriers ever seen here. Score—Westville 2; Abbies 0.

Eighth Inning, Westville—Marshall hits over short right field fence for two bags; Corrigan hits McQuaid—Marshall is caught stealing third on the hit; McIsaac out to McEachern. McMillan flies out to Diamond.  
Abbies—Diamond bunts beautifully along third base line; Cronin starts for second, but is doubled on the catch McEachern starts the beating of the Abbies first run, beating a fumble by Oliver and going to second on the overthrow. McEachern scores on Ryan's short double to centre. Wild cheering greets the former on crossing the plate. McCarey fans. Score—Westville 2; Abbies 1.

Ninth Inning, Westville—Darrach hit by "Lefty" and goes down for a free ride. Williams is caught at second by McEachern who handles B. Dunbar's grounder. Oliver ends the half with no further scoring. McEachern again doing the damage—on the defence.  
Abbies—Amid loud cheering and many entreaties from the many fans, the Abbies go to bat. Francis endeavors to do their bidding by hitting a screaming liner to deep centre. It looked like three bags and a perfect hit; he was bbed however, when McIsaac by superior human ability snags said liner after a hard run. Not to be outdone McQuaid takes a big hand in winning his own game by hitting to left for a single, Williams running
