United States Market. Shipments of dairy cattle to the United States are given in this report as 1,869 head, but this figure includes 742 cattle shipped from Quebec and the Maritimes in the previous week, figures for which were not obtainable at the time of publication of our last report.

Calves Higher in East. Calf markets in eastern Canada recovered much of the losses sustained in the previous week and Toronto was 25 cents higher, with choice veals at \$15 to \$15.50 and a few as high as \$16.

Lambs Again Strong Sellers. Further advances were again recorded in the lamb market and Toronto, to sell at \$19 per cwt. for choice quality. As high as \$20 was paid per cwt. for spring lambs on good quality at Montreal, and Winnipeg had some as high as \$16.50.

Hogs Generally Unchanged. There was little disturbance in hog prices and Toronto had the basic grade at \$16.75 to \$16.85, Montreal \$17 to \$17.25, Winnipeg \$16.75 to \$17, Calgary \$15.40, Edmonton \$15.50, Moose Jaw, Regina and Saskatoon \$15.50, Vancouver \$16.30 to \$16.40, and Moncton \$17.25.

Queen Presides At Investiture

LONDON, June 23 (CP Cable)—The Queen, the first woman to preside at an investiture since Queen Victoria, presented the Victoria Cross this week to Wing Cmdr. Guy Gibson, leader of the raid on the Mohne and Eder Dams last month, and decorated six Canadians who participated in the daring aerial attack.

In the absence of the King, who was in the Mediterranean area, her Majesty congratulated the recipients and said the King had asked her to express his regrets that he was not able to be present. The Canadians and their awards are: Distinguished Flying Cross—PO. G. A. Deering, Toronto, and O. H. T. Taerum, Calgary. Bar to D.P.C.—FO. D. R. Walker, Blairmore, Alta. Conspicuous Gallantry Medal—1. Sgt. K. W. Brown, Moose Jaw, Sask. Distinguished Flying Medal—1. Sgt. D. A. MacLean, Toronto, and Sgt. S. Oancia, Stonehenge, Sask. A member of the R.C.A.F., 1st Lt. Joseph C. McCarthy, St. James, N. Y., also on the raid, received the Eiderdome service order. He already held the D.F.C. Gibson in charge of the operation, became the 64th recipient of the V.C. He also holds the D.P.C. and Bar and the D.S.O. and Bar.

Interim Report On Reconstruction

OTTAWA, June 23 (CP)—The special House of Commons committee on reconstruction and rehabilitation today recommended an immediate survey of Canada's natural resources to obtain complete information on desirable development projects for the post-war period. The committee's interim report, tabled in the House of Commons by Gray Turgeon (Lib. Carleton), committee chairman, also proposed the application of the provisions of the prairie farm rehabilitation act to all Canada, as a means of improving agricultural life all across the country.

The proper utilization of our resources will provide both employment and opportunities for colonization and industrial development through flood control, irrigation, reforestation, conservation of water, the exploration of mineral and oil deposits, the development of water power and the provision of highway and railway transportation where required by settlers or by industry," said the report. The committee reported it knew many sound and useful projects which could be undertaken but found that an inventory should be made so information would be available to all governments on the usefulness of each project, its cost and its value in terms of employment.

Provision of better housing was necessary in many parts of Canada, the committee said, and it proposed the Federal Government take power to finance, or assist in financing, housing development. The government, it said, should consider establishing some body to provide for carrying out these undertakings.

The committee reported it had not completed its study of agriculture, fishing and coal mining and would report further on developments in these industries. It expressed concern over the demobilization of the armed forces and the fact that those who are engaged in the final stages of the war will be the last to be demobilized and the last to be absorbed into industry.

Every member of the forces was entitled to particular attention, and unemployment would not recur in Canada. Since the supreme function of government was human welfare, parliament and government should be prepared to make every effort to prevent unemployment.

The actual definite steps that must be taken to prevent mass unemployment permanently are matters of controversy upon which your committee is not yet ready to make recommendations," it stated. The work of the committee will be reported for the remainder of the session. The interim report was submitted, it was stated, to place before the government suggestions for immediate action.

Good News on the Way Soon

Later this year, or early in 1944, individual Canadians will receive a statement of the amount of refundable income tax payments which stand to their credit for the year 1942. This is money collected as income tax, popularly known as the compulsory savings portion. It is to be returned to taxpayers after the war, together with interest at two percent. The statement will be sent out by the Department of National Revenue as part of the income tax notice of assessment. The certificate will be white with a sketch of the Parliament Buildings printed in blue in the background. Note—Your certificate cannot be sent unless you file your 1942 income tax form.
