MINISTERS AND MEMBERS TAKING OFFICE.

It is pointed out by the Opposition press that already since the Laurier Government obtained power, two of its members, Sir Oliver Mowat and Sir Henri Joll, have been appointed to Governorships. With the appointments already made the same journals usually refer to others alleged to be in prospect, and so make up quite a formidable list. Yet the fact is that the appointments made have been quite in the ordinary course of affairs. That it has been common to appoint members of the Government, or members of Parliament to high positions will appear from the most casual survey of the records. If we take Governorships alone we shall find that since the Confederation the Conservative party has appointed 41 persons to those high positions who were previously members of one or other of the two Houses of Parliament, and most of whom had been members of Conservative Cabinets.

If we add Judgeships and Senatorships it will be found that the Conservative appointments during the same time amount to hundreds, including many who had been Cabinet Ministers. We are not mentioning these to take objection to the practice. It is, we think, not objectionable to appoint to the Senate or to the Bench one who by frequent election to the Commons or a Provincial Legislature has shown that he possesses the confidence of the people if he is otherwise qualified. What is much more open to criticism is the appointment of a defeated candidate to the Senate or to be Judge of a Court. Both parties have done this repeatedly. But even among such cases there have been many instances in which the defeat had been a mere temporary reverse, following a long series of elections by the people. Such a case was the appointment of Hon. David Mills to the Senate in 1896. He had been defeated in the previous election, but had been continuously elected from 1897 down to 1896 and was then in a minority of only 87 votes in a large constituency.

It is true that a section of the Liberal party when in opposition took the ground that no member of Parliament ought to accept any office of emolument until one or two years after he had ceased to be a representative of the people. This contention is based on the view that the hope and expectation of office necessarily deprives a member of his independence. It is said that a member sitting and voting with the expectation of receiving a Senatorship, Judgeship or other perman-

ent position will invariably vote in support of the Ministers holding the power to appoint him, whose promise to that end he has perhaps received. The objection is within certain limits a valid one, but it is quite clear that under the party system members follow their leaders very closely, whether they are or are not living in the expectation of receiving such appointment. It is not therefore by any means established that the existing system of from time to time appointing a member to permanent office operates to any large extent to destroy the independence of Parliament. The party system does precisely that.

The existing practice can be defended on the ground of immemorial and repeated precedent in all countries that have representative institutions. Probably very few persons seek to be representatives of the people with the expectation of never obtaining some other reward than the mere honor of that position and the indemnity attached to it. On the people's part there is also usually the expectation that their representative will win a good official position if he can, and hence there is no real breach of the understanding between them when he vacates his seat in Parliament to accept an appointment. It is on general grounds fitting that the higher official positions in the country shall be filled from among those who have demonstrated that they have the confidence of the people, and so long as we have representative institutions we may expect that such appointments will from time to time be made by both our political parties.

There is evidently no great love for prohibition in either party at Ottawa. By a vote of 98 to 41 the Commons has declared the country is not yet ripe for a prohibitory law. Mr. Flint's resolution in favor of giving Prohibition to the Provinces which gave majorities in its favor at the plebiscite was also voted down. This attitude of the federal Parliament towards the question shows the importance of the action taken by the Legislatures of Prince Edward Island and Manitoba. It was evidently a case of Provincial Prohibition or nothing.

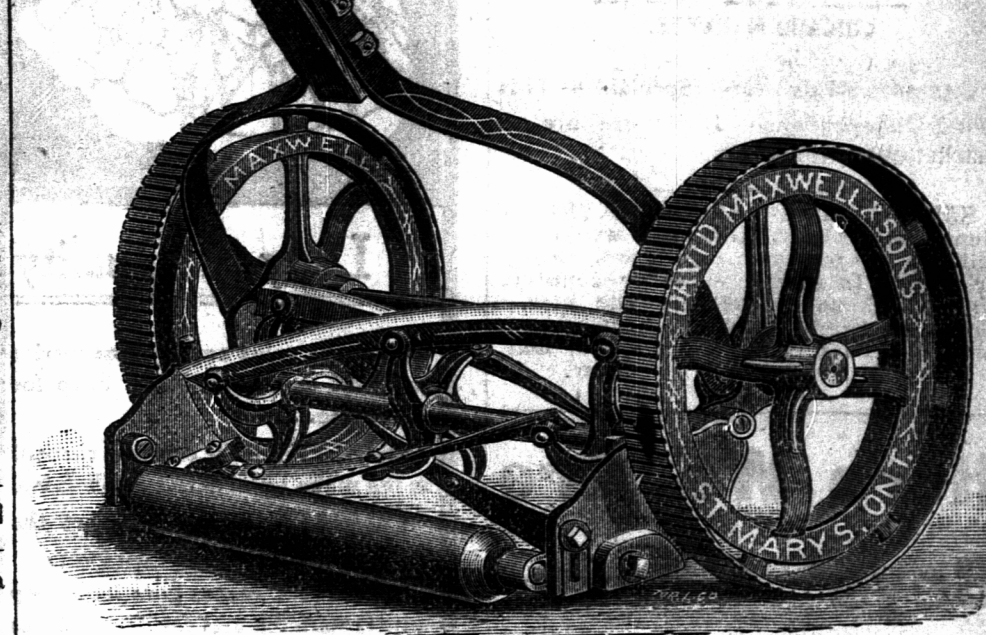
