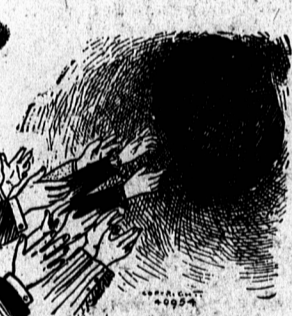

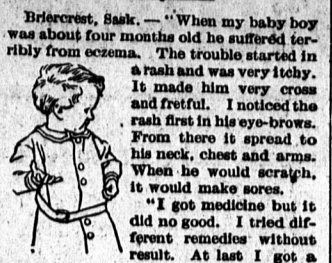

The meeting was called to order at 8 p. m., with the President, William Whalen in the chair. The chief business of the evening was to dispose of a thorough-bred Ayrshire bull. The animal is a two year old registered Ayrshire weighing 92 lbs and is from a good milking strain. At the Charlottetown Exhibition of 1913, he won third prize, the first and second prizes were won by his half-brother. As the meeting was very small, some discussion took place as to the advisability of postponing the sale until a future date. It was moved by Peter McIsaac and seconded by Peter Lyons that the auction take place and, if the bid be less than \$35, that the animal be sold at the next meeting. An amendment was moved by John Malone and seconded by James McAulay that \$45 be the minimum amount. The motion was carried. The animal was then auctioned off by the secretary and sold to Mr. Frank McAulay, Cherry Grove, for \$36. It was moved by Charles McKinnon, seconded by Donald McAulay and carried, that the janitor receive fifty-cent per meeting for his service. The secretary was asked to write to persons having pure bred stock for sale and to report at the next night of meeting. Some were in favor of buying more pure bred stock and several letters from persons having such for sale were read. Mr. Peter McIsaac moved that the regular annual fee be left uncollected until next fall and that a special collection of fifty cents per member be taken up before the first of March for the purpose of buying more pure bred stock. This motion was seconded by John Malone and carried. It was decided that the subject for discussion at each meeting should be known before hand so that each member might come prepared. The meeting then adjourned to meet on Saturday, Feb. 21st.
