EXECUTIVE COUNCIL.—The Executive Council will meet to-day in the Legislative Chambers, at 2 p.m.

BELOW UPSET PRICE.—At eleven o'clock in the forenoon yesterday, Mr. R. Bealroto, licensed auctioneer, offered for sale at public auction, the premises at lot 196, Richmond street, city, the residence and office of the late Dr. James McLeod. The sale was conducted on the instructions of Messrs. McLeod & Bentley. There was a small attendance of bidders. Bidding started at \$2,500 and went to \$3,000 at which figure it stopped. But that offer, which was made by Mr. J. J. McKinnon, was not accepted, as the amount was below the upset price.

CONCRETE SIDEWALK.—In pursuance of their plan to lay down a certain additional portion of concrete sidewalks in the city this year, the employees of the City Council are at present at work in this respect in Fitzroy street. The footpath along the northern side of the street is being concreted for the distance comprised in the boundaries of Prince street on the west and Weymouth street on the east. The southern side of Fitzroy street already has a concrete sidewalk beyond Prince street. With the completion of the work on the northern side the street will not be improved in appearance but the convenience to pedestrians will be rendered equally greater.

Several matters of business were disposed of after which the supervisor demonstrated the Canning of Beans and Peas. This was found very interesting and helpful. All those present took part in the discussion following and many instructive ideas were advanced. That interest in the work of this institute is growing is shown by the large membership list. At the close of the meeting a dainty supper was served by Mrs. Milligan which added not a little to the enjoyment and sociability of the meeting. A vote of thanks was tendered both to the hostess and supervisor for their part in making this gathering such a success.

WEDDING BELLS.—The pretty home wedding of Mr. Thomas Woodruff's youngest daughter, Miss Susan Jean and Mr. Archibald Munro of Wood Islands was celebrated at their home Cove Head Road on Wednesday evening, August 28th, at 5 p. m. The couple were married in the parlor which was beautifully decorated with ferns and sweet peas. The ceremony was performed by Rev. E. A. Westmoreland. The bride's sister, Miss Belle, from Brookline, Mass, acted as bridesmaid, while the groom's cousin Mr. Archibald D. McNeill ably supported the groom. RAG WORT EXTERMINATED.—According to Dr. Pethick, of the Department of Agriculture ragwort is now exterminated here. It got a slight hold sometime ago in Souris, but immediately steps were taken to eradicate it and with complete success. Dr. Pethick is still carefully investigating the peculiar poison of the weed, and the Department is in communication with the agricultural chemists in London with a view to discovering the particular alkaloid which is responsible for the slow poisoning of the animals which may eat the weed in hay.

BROOKFIELD.—The Revd. Principal McKinnon of the Presbyterian Theological College, Halifax, N. S., and the Revd. G. A. Sutherland of Kensington will conduct the services in the congregation of Brookfield, etc., first Sabbath, Aug. 31st. The appointments are as follows:—Clyde River 11 a. m., Brookfield, 3 p. m., and Hunter River 7 p. m. The services in the Presbyterian churches at Brookfield and Clyde River, on Sabbath, Sept. 7th, will be conducted by the Rev. John Pringle D. D., of St. Andrews church, Sydney, C. E.
