MOLASSES.—The molasses situation has for the time being ceased to be of interest. The crop has all been shipped from Barbados, prices are steady at the high level, and stocks are just about sufficient to last through the remainder of the season. No change in the price is anticipated for some time to come says the Maritime Merchant.

BANK DIVIDENDS.—The Board of the Canadian Bank of Commerce have declared the usual quarterly dividend to the rate of 10 per cent per annum and a bonus of 1 per cent. The books will be closed from 16th November to 30th, November inclusive. Similar action was taken by the Bank of Montreal last week, and since then there have been the regular declarations of the Bank of Hamilton, the Quebec Bank, and the Banque d'Hochelega.

HIGH PRICE OF PICKLED HERRING.—Even the humble herring has not been neglected in the recent advancing movement of food prices says the Maritime Merchant. One wholesale man is of the impression now that the fishermen have sufficient stocks, but are holding them, in order to keep the market in their own favor. We don't know how much there is in this, but the opinion of the wholesaler in question is that about as clever as any other class when it comes to a business deal. Half barrels of choice, well-cared-for herring have been selling lately at \$3.75, which is about the price barrels sold for a year or two ago.

LONDON, Nov. 5.—The Daily Express says:—
Wheat reached the extraordinary price of eighty shillings (\$20) per quarter, \$2.50 a bushel on the Baltic change yesterday. There is a little hope that prices have attended their fall, and an immediate rise in the price of bread is anticipated.
A conference of South Wales miners at Cardiff decided to place before the Triple Alliance of miners, Railmen and Transport Workers the question of Government control of all food supplies, and threatened a one day strike in that coal field unless immediate action is taken.
The Scottish miners resolved at Glasgow to call a large conference of the labor and progressive forces of the country to decide what steps shall be used to force the Government to assume full control of all the necessary commodities and to fix retail prices.
