In four separate issues 2,134,275 copies of "Seasonable Hints" were mailed, while a total of 1,06,724 copies of market reports, issued by the various Branches of the Department, were sent out. This represents an increase of nearly 25 per cent in this phase of the work of the Branch. It is in this way that the results of the research and experimental work of the several Branches of the Department are passed along to Canadian farmers.
