### MAY LOSE EYE SIGHT.

DARTMOUTH, June 20—Ernest H. Hill, one of the most prominent manufacturers of Dartmouth, is reported to be in a very critical condition as the result of being struck by a well-known business man of the town, a few days ago, who is alleged to have hit Mr. Hill back of the ear and behind the eyes. The blow Mr. Hill received between the eyes is responsible for his present alarming condition. Mr. Hill had glasses on at the time, and they were smashed in atoms, particles of which pierced both eyes.

Two specialists were in attendance yesterday. It was found that Mr. Hill is suffering from hemorrhages of the eyes, and it is believed that he will lose the sight of both. In fact, so badly injured are the eyes that there is a possibility that both will have to be removed.

The cause of the row is said to have been a somewhat heated business discussion. It is alleged that the assailant visited the Rolling Mills office and conversed with Mr. Hill about a delivery of some iron some time in October.

The discussion lasted but a very few minutes, and so did the fight, which, according to an eye witness, was all on one side. The assailant is alleged to have struck Mr. Hill unawares. One blow drove Mr. Hill through one of the office windows, and he might have been more seriously punished had it not been for the timely arrival of one of the employees, who quickly interfered.

### NOVA SCOTIA CONFERENCE

AMHERST, June 20—The formal opening of the Nova Scotia conference of the Methodist church took place this morning. The roll call showed an attendance of 160 clerical and lay delegates. Rev. Dr. George J. Bond presided, and introduced the general superintendent, Rev. Dr. Chown, to the conference. This is the first official visit that Dr. Chown has made to Nova Scotia since his appointment to his position. He gave a stirring address to the conference. The election of officers followed. Rev. John Astbury of Port Hawkesbury, was elected president on the first ballot, and Rev. W. I. Croft, of Pugwash, was re-elected secretary, and Rev. Bradford Porter was elected statistical secretary.

Tonight a reception meeting was held for the new candidates to the ministry, and Rev. S. R. Emeet, Plowman, Frank Armstrong Percy M. Hall, and Edward Graham, were received. Addresses were given by Rev. J. Appleby, pastor-elect of Hunsford street Methodist church, and Rev. H. Burgess, of Shubenacadie.

### THAW PLANNED SUICIDE.

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., June 21.—In the hearing of the case of Harry Thaw, seeking release from Mattawan today Mrs. Thaw testified that her husband made a proposal at the Grand Hotel, in New York in 1904 that they both commit suicide. He had the details all planned she said. They were to engage rooms at the Waldorf and drink poison. He had even fixed the hour.
