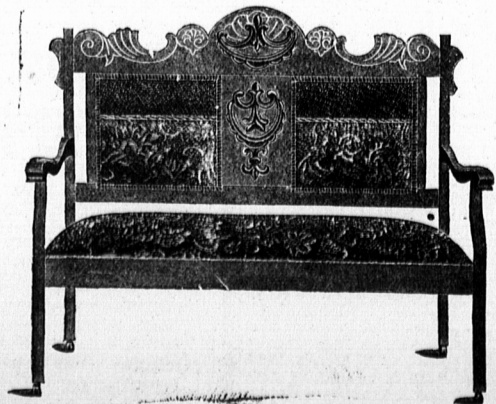

THE COLLEGE OF HERALDS.

Some inquiries have been called forth by the announcement from Ottawa published in The Guardian of yesterday that the coats of arms of Manitoba and Prince Edward Island have been changed somewhat by the College of Heralds, London. The Herald's College, or College of Arms was established in 1483 by Richard III and has jurisdiction throughout the British Empire except in Scotland and Ireland in all matters pertaining to coats of arms, whether for individuals, cities, Provinces or Kingdoms. In Scotland the corresponding functions belong to the Lyon Court and in Ireland to the College of Arms, Dublin. No one in the United Kingdom is entitled to "bear arms," that is to use a coat of arms or even a crest, without a hereditary claim thereto by descent, or a grant from a competent authority, and the unlawful assumption of such distinction is an act punishable by penalty. There is also an annual tax payable by all who have coats of arms.

Persons who have a hereditary claim to arms which has been disused for one or more generations may be entitled to resume them on proof and registration of pedigree. A person who has no hereditary claim and wishes a grant of arms must, in England, memorialise the Earl Marshal of the Herald's College and show that he is in a condition to "sustain the rank of gentry." If claiming by descent from an ancestor in Scotland or Ireland he must make good his claim before the Lyons Court, Edinburgh, or the College of Arms, Dublin. An important department of all these Colleges of Heraldry is the recording of pedigrees. Any pedigree showing the existing state of the descent of a family, if accompanied with sufficient evidence, may be entered on the registry of the College. The mere fact of one's bearing the same surname with a family entitled to arms confers no right to wear those arms. But such persons may, in Scotland, obtain an original grant of the right to wear the family arms "differenced," on petition and payment of a fee of £12.

The charge ordered in our provincial coat of arms is the addition at the top of the shield of "a lion passant," that is, looking out from the field toward the observer, observant, or on guard. The lion holds an important place among the animals borne in coat armor. As early as the twelfth century the king of beasts was assumed as an appropriate emblem by the sovereigns of England, Scotland, Norway and Denmark. The earliest attitude of the heraldic lion is rampant, erect on his hind legs and looking before him, the head being shown in profile, as he appears in the arms of Scotland. This was the normal position for a lion; but as the animal came to be used by all who claimed kindred with royalty, a diversity of attitude was granted for distinction's sake. So we have the lion passant, as above, or rampant guardant, erect on the hind legs and full faced; passant, in a walking position, with the head seen in profile; passant guardant, walking and full faced; with many other attitudes. Generally speaking the lion gets its new and royal emblem because it bears the name of a Prince of royal blood.

Mr. McDonald has kindly offered the free use of the bridge and other plant necessary to afford the best possible means of conveying the passengers from the south to and from Charlottetown during those days and we feel assured that his generosity and the efforts of the Superintendent of the railway will be fully appreciated by the travelling public and patrons of the Exhibition.

If this glorious September weather is duplicated next week it will make the fortune of our exhibition.

The New Brunswick Exhibition opens as a record-breaker in attendance and the number of exhibitors. We trust that like results may be noted here. All will be ready for a splendid Fair. The weather is the one uncertain quantity.

Rumors are current in New Brunswick that Hon. A. G. Blair will re-enter political life. When questioned on the subject the other day he said, "We never know what will happen from one day to another and it would not surprise me if I did happen to get back into politics at sometime."

The need of the promised electric light at the railway crossing on St. Peter's Road is greatly felt, but not yet supplied. It ought certainly to be put in before the Exhibition opens. This crossing is always a dangerous one, and the danger is greatly increased by the enlarged traffic on both the road and the railway at times when so many are coming and going.

Sir Wilfrid at the manufacturer's banquet in Quebec talked of a "scientific tariff," whatever that may mean, and the meaning is quite clear. He also laid stress on the importance of prompt, regular and reasonable transportation between the west and east. This is vital, but it cannot be provided in the case of Prince Edward Island till we get the Tunnel at the Capes.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Homestead Regulations

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent receive authority for some one to make entry for him.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father for mother, if the father is deceased, of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
