IMPROVED SERVICE

(Canadian Press.) OTTAWA (Ont.), Feb. 5.—In the Commons this afternoon Alphonse Verreille, labor M. P., introduced a Bill making it criminal for any manufacturer or business man to employ untrained men without consent of the Attorney General of the province or to use a telephone to inquire any one's character or disclose private business. It does not prohibit the use of detectaphone for detection of crime.

ISLAND INVENTOR

GRANT OF PATENT

Patent No. 76945 which has been granted Mr. Harry McTavish of this province on folding box and crates some few days ago is now being considered by manufacturers in Ontario, Michigan. Through the efforts of Mr. Carlson, who obtained the patent and who will transact all the business in connection with the patent thereof. Already one thousand copies and blue prints of the patent has been prepared and will be used to demonstrate the device to capitalists. Some two years ago a packing box was invented by Mr. Henry C. Schafer of Dayton, Ohio. This box patented by Victor I. Evans, for Schafer, who will also up by Mr. Carlson, who will also secure British rights. The British patent covers England, Wales, Scotland, Ireland and the Channel Islands. This is not the only device Mr. McTavish has invented for a few days ago he completed a device in extension tables. This table is operated by a drawer in the side of it. In order to extend the table nearly ever was not contented with this but maintained that an extension table could be devised along those lines and after some experimenting and studying succeeded in this device of extension table which could seat fourteen people. This table requires no center leg. Mr. McTavish has also invented an adjustable harness hook which is now being manufactured and tested for him at Stevensons Model Dockyard in Liverpool, England, and on which Mr. Carlson is now securing a U. S. Patent. He also invented the extension lock cover for egg cases. This cover goes on without nails and cannot be taken off unless the secret is known.

USE OF DETECTOPHONE TO BE RESTRICTED

OTTAWA, Feb. 5.—Legislation against the use of the detectaphone, except under legal restrictions, is sought in a Bill which was introduced in the House today by Alphonse Verreille, labor member for Maisonville. He contended that unless legally restricted the use of the detectaphone would prove a menace to society for no family would be secure and no organized body safeguarded.

HINTS FOR THE HOUSEWIFE

If greasy water is allowed to run into drain pipes and no effort is made with boiling water, the result will be a coating of grease along the pipes and over the escapes. The best remedy is to drop down into the pipes equal parts of salt and soda and then, later, flood the pipes with boiling water.

A weak milk and water solution is also good for sponging the leaves of palms and India-rubber plants. It is necessary to sponge upper and lower sides of the leaves and the stems as well every week. These plants are attacked by two enemies; the red spider, too small to be seen by the naked eye covers the entire leaf with all impenetrable web. Tobacco smoke kills the spider but the web must be washed off.
