



**NEW RIFLE RANGE.**—Riflemen throughout the province will welcome the news that the work in connection with the new rifle range which the Dominion Government is to lay out in Summerside will be hurried on and probably be completed this summer, especially as it is the intention of members of the Summerside Rifle Club to hold a two-day rifle meet-prize meeting, open to the competition of the whole Island during the summer. It is the intention to make the new range as up-to-date as possible, and it was learned yesterday from Mr. Lucas Allen, one of the foremost rifle shots in the western town, who was in the city, that the new range will cost in the vicinity of \$15,000 and will have provision for shooting up to a thousand yards longer than the Kensington rifle range in Charlottetown. The existence of such another good range in the Island will be a factor that will serve to give a flip to the already ready great interest in this fascinating art.
