subscribers since the last statement which was up to April 30th, 1931, and which was submitted at the Annual Meeting of the hospital one year ago.

You will note that according to the Report of last year, which will be found in the Hospital Report, the First Campaign Fund had to its credit on April 30th, 1931, the sum of \$40,499.60.

This amount is invested as follows: City of Charlottetown Bonds due 1944 at 5%, \$5,092.00; Dominion of Canada Bonds due 1934 at 4 1/2%, \$27,900.46.

At this time we proposed building a 100 to 110 bed hospital with Nurses Home and outside power plant, figuring that if collections came in as they had been doing up to that time that we would have together with the old fund about \$400,000 and we planned on having the Government guarantee our bonds for the other \$200,000.

Unfortunately we ran into very difficult times. The general depression has made collections somewhat slow, and before we had a chance to approach the Government regarding the guaranteeing of our bonds, the Government had experienced a tremendous loss by the burning of two of their largest public buildings, namely the Falconwood Mental Hospital and the Prince of Wales College.

Rebuilding Necessary As it is absolutely necessary that these buildings be rebuilt as early as possible, it meant the straining of the credit of the Province to such an extent that the Government felt they could not possibly undertake any greater burden without seriously interfering with the sale of their bonds.

On motion of Mr. Heartz, seconded by Mr. Tidmarsh, the retiring trustees, Mr. J. M. McFadyen and Dr. H. D. Johnson, were re-elected.

The President thanked Rev. Mr. Raymond for the use of the Hall. Mr. Raymond replied suitably and moved a vote of thanks to the staff of the Hospital for their co-operation and courtesy at all times. This was seconded by Rev. E. H. Ramtaylor and carried.

Mr. S. A. McLeod in answer to enquiry by Rev. Mr. Raymond as to what was being done about the new hospital stated the new plans had arrived Thursday morning, they had been gone over by the medical staff and found very satisfactory. The new building will cost only about half the original proposal. However it will accommodate only about 85 beds, there will be no nurses home, and the power plant must be located in the main building. The tenders will be called for in a few weeks and the work gone ahead with.

Dr. J. A. Clark also stated the plans had been found most satisfactory. He highly commended the architecture of the building. The suggestion of Mrs. Clarke that the Ladies Aid receive some credit for this good work was received with applause.

The meeting closed with benediction by Rev. A. C. Vincent.

Some of the Grecian's men on the City of Chattanooga were injured, but none of the crew of the heavier ship was hurt. Three negro firemen were brought to the marine hospital at Vineyard Haven, Mass., aboard a coast guard boat, which had intercepted the City of Chattanooga. The men were Thomas Nottage, Albert Jennings, and John Walker, all of Baltimore.

The Grecian, a small steel screw steamer operated by the merchants and miners transportation between Boston and southern ports, was plunging through heavy seas to Norfolk, Va., with a cargo of general freight when she and the City of Chattanooga collided at 1:50 a.m. (Eastern Standard Time). She sank five miles north of Block Island, just off the Rhode Island coast, with her spars jutting above the water.

Coast guard patrol boats were summoned at once, but it was not until five hours later that the destroyer Uphur found the first body. The steamer Ontario offered aid, but the City of Chattanooga replied: "We do not need any assistance. The Master of the Grecian is safe aboard the City of Chattanooga. The damage to our ship is unknown, but considered slight. Four members of Grecian's crew still unaccounted for. The United States cutter Uphur has arrived and is assisting in the search for the missing men."

The City of Chattanooga, running between Savannah and Boston, remained at anchor beside the sunken Grecian for several hours before continuing her trip to Boston. Built in 1923, she is a craft of 4,343 net tons, while the Grecian is 2,827 tons.

"We had a fine trip and I am glad to be back in Ottawa," said Sir George. He said he was in perfect health and his appearance supported the statement. Senator Gideon Robertson, who was in Geneva with Canada's delegation to the international labor convention and who suffered an illness while there, also returned to Ottawa today, accompanied by Mrs. Robertson.

Although showing the effect of his illness Senator Robertson was cheerful and optimistic. "I am not well," he said, "but I am in much better health than I was a few weeks ago." The disarmament conference met under most unfortunate conditions, Sir George said. Occurrences in the Far East and in Europe tended to make most difficult any progress toward an agreement on armaments, and the recent developments in France rendered it impossible for that country's delegates to speak with authority until the middle of June.

The French Parliament would not assemble until the first of June and it would take at least two weeks to get into operation and secure a vote of confidence in the Government. The conference would therefore be at a standstill until that time at least.

Make Escape

DORCHESTER, N. B., May 27. (By the Canadian Press)—Sawing through window bars with smuggled tools, three prisoners escaped from the county jail here last night, it was learned today. The prisoners, Gordon V. B. King, New York, George Rogers, Endland, and Fred McCallum, Truro, N. S., were away before the break was discovered at breakfast time. It was believed that the men escaped about 9 p. m.
