## A Word About the Ranch --Ranching Done at Cost

Because of the lateness of the season the directorate has thought it advisable to defer the construction of the Eastern ranch until the spring. It is now so very near breeding time that the shifting of the foxes might prove inimical to results and for that fact the foxes have been boarded out for the winter at a cost arrangement that will not exceed 1 or 2 per cent. of the value of the increase.

The ranch, when built, will be located near Charlottetown and the ranching will be done at the actual cost of feeding and looking after the foxes—not on a percentage basis as most companies are figuring on.

The ranch management including a day care-taker, night watchman, veterinary, etc., have not yet been secured but the company will spare no effort to make such details equally good with the best now before the public.
