Free State is "simply claiming judicial interpretation of the clause of the Treaty by the appointing tribunals. The Freeman's press, discussing the issue, says that the Free State has no motive of aggrandisement in its demands, and has no desire to cripple the Northern Government."

It is freely stated by observers that the demands of Ulster, and her fears that she will not obtain what she regards as the irreducible minimum before the Boundary Commission are slowly forcing the hands of Tyrone and Fermanagh, and driving them into the arms of the Free State.

It is believed that President Cosgrave intends to introduce a bill immediately to insure passage of his amending measure in the Dail, before further delay gives the opposition a chance of strengthening their hands.

Northern Ore-Beds Formed Before Rocky Mountains.

Geological holocausts which led to the formation of the metallic deposits in northern Ontario were depicted in the geology section of the British Association by Prof. M. B. Baker, of Queen's University who told how two huge ranges of mountains, greater and probably older than the Rockies, were forced up on the surface of North America, and then gouged off again before the continent took its present shape.

The surviving rocks of this shuffling process, which took place in the earliest, or pre-Cambrian geological age, occupy more than one half of the area of Canada, and the nearest to Toronto are those of the Muskoka area.

Shows Water Vapor Determines Weather.

The circulation of the atmosphere depends fundamentally upon the warming of the surface of the earth by the sun's rays, and the cooling effect of radiation, according to Sir Napier Shaw, professor of meteorology at the Imperial College of Science and Technology, who spoke in the physics section at the British Association.

The controlling factor of weather, he explained, is the distribution of water vapor in the atmosphere and the degree of saturation. "The two factors must be taken into account in any theoretical study of climate," he said.

"If we consider the effect of 'dry heat' alone, we can form an idea of what the general circulation would be if there was no water vapor at all in the air."

Ontario Indian Population Has Four Groups European.

"We know from historical sources that the Huron-Indian peninsula was occupied by the following tribes and tribal groups of the Iroquoian stock, but we have no definite historical information as to what tribes were represented."

Some post-European sites in the region between the Grand River and the Niagara frontier indicate Seneca settlement. From the archaeological evidence available, it is probable that the Iroquoian culture passes through four stages in its development, said Dr. Wintemberg.

Public attention had been directed to this detrimental factor just in time and it remained for organizations such as the one in charge to discover and apply a remedy. Not all then would this heavy drain on the population of the province cease.

Mr. Sanford Phillips, O'Leary, stressed the urgent necessity of grading all farm products as the only cure for many existing exportation troubles, as the farmers and dealers should stand by the farmers in endeavoring to procure a more advanced and satisfactory system of grading. The speaker suggested changes in the road system as used for transportation.

Mr. C. E. MacKenzie, a great statesman of the Dominion, pointed out the troubles confronting the farmer and merchant as a common problem was contained in the address of President Hyndman, especially in its stress on the value of co-operation. This was the only available means of elevating the status of the farmer and thereby creating an inducement to keep the farmer from leaving the farm at all times. He joined with the previous speaker in urging a better system for grading farm products.

Mr. J. N. Fraser, East Point, united with the other speakers in their belief that the prevailing "get together" spirit was significant and of great things for the Island and hoped that the full co-operation so much desired by all would be one of the results of the meeting.

Mr. Nelson Rattenbury repeated that the urgency for an improved grading system already referred to was one of the great essentials towards co-operation between farmer and merchant. He had mentioned the matter to Hon. Mr. Motherwell, Federal Minister of Agriculture who, he had no doubt, would give full consideration to any resolution asking for an inspector of hay intended for export, if that resolution were passed by the meeting. He related a specific instance in which an inspector would have prevented a considerable loss experienced by Mr. R. E. Match and himself last fall, when they sent a shipment of 500 tons of hay to Cuba. At the destination a small portion of the cargo was found to be in an unsatisfactory condition; this affected the entire shipment and made the investment a losing one.

Mr. Phillips mentioned the fact that a resolution to the effect that a hay inspector was necessary was passed by the O'Leary Farmers Institute last year. Discussion on the matter followed and resulted in the passing of a resolution asking the Federal Government to appoint the desired official.

Mr. R. E. Match introduced the matter of providing freight transportation for the fall's seed potato crop and spoke of the improvements being made to the freight sheds on the Railroad Wharf at Charlottetown.

Mr. C. R. Rogers stated that similar improvements were being made in addition to its being completely overhauled and the channel sufficiently deepened and lengthened to allow two vessels being berthed at the wharf at the one time.

Mr. P. W. Clarkin of the meeting at St. John's, the Canadian Bureau of Statistics and the Bureau of Agriculture of the Province should be established in this work and that our Provincial Government should be asked to establish such a Bureau at the earliest possible date with the further recommendations that an advisory committee be appointed to co-operate with the Bureau consisting of the President of the Association.

WHEREAS sufficient publicity has not been given in the past to our Resources and Possibilities to encourage these two classes to come our way.

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Mr. H. H. Acorn, Souris spoke of the almost miraculous success that had attended the new rule of the road which went into effect on May 1st. Those who had prophesied endless trouble had been sadly disappointed, while the autoists and farmers immediately concerned were loud in their praises of the change, the credit for introducing which goes to the Association.

The speaker also congratulated the Government on the necessity of additional alertness continually before the minds of the driving public had avoided serious accidents. The speaker discussed problems in suggesting reforms in the Island's educational and road upkeep systems. The suggestion was made that a skillfully constructed conspectus of meeting men had good chances of meeting one of the Island's greatest problems. As to roads the speaker deplored the present obsolete methods of allowing settlement of taxes by means of labor on the roads. This system was a most unsatisfactory one if viewed from a financial and industrial standpoint. The dealers and wholesalers came in for some severe criticism from the speaker when he spoke of the subject of egg grading. Mr. Acorn maintained that the satisfactory grading of the egg circles proved the advisability of all grading being done by men in government employ never by private concerns. He suggested several other subjects for discussion of which should be taken up at future assemblies.

Mr. J. G. Davidson, representing the Dominion Live Stock Department made the statement that wholesalers dealing in eggs had
