The match was fired at 500 yards—ten shots. Here Capt J. A. MacDonald, Light Horse, shooting for Mrs. C. Leigh, and Sgt. J. A. Moore 282nd, shooting for Mrs. V. L. Goodwill, tied for first place, with a score of 48 each. In the shoot-off 5 shots Capt. MacDonald scored 19, and Sgt. Moore 23, the latter winning the Trophy for Mrs. Goodwill. It is hoped that before next meeting the number of targets will be increased and that the matches can then be concluded in three days without crowding. 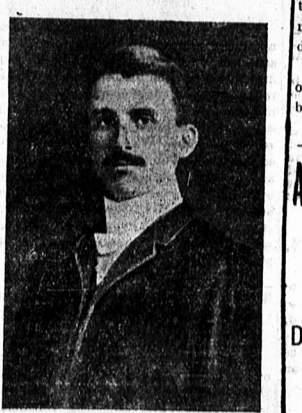

W. V. NEWSON, M. Sc.

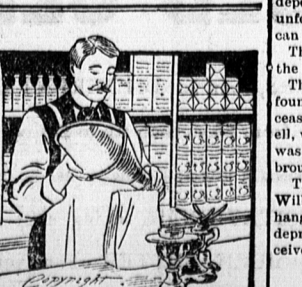

SIR WM. MACDONALD WILL VISIT P. E. I.

He is Coming For the Purpose of Noting the Progress Made in Consolidated and Manual Training School.

TRURO, Aug. 15.—Arrangements are now being made by Prof. J. W. Robertson, C. M. G., on behalf of Sir William Macdonald, for the latter to pay a visit in September to the various towns and cities in which Macdonald Manual Training Schools or Rural Schools have been established, for the purpose of noting the progress made. Sir William Macdonald and party will first visit Fredericton, thence to Prince Edward Island, where six schools of various kinds have been established; then Truro, Bible Hill, Brookfield and possibly Belmont and Great Village in this Country.

MARITIME BOARD OF TRADE FAVORS MARITIME UNION

And will Send Memorials to the Three Governments—Capt. Read Doubts Whether Islanders Would Favor it—Other Important Resolutions Adopted—Next Meeting in Amherst—The Officers Elected.

YARMOUTH, Aug. 17.—(Special)—The Maritime Board of Trade today passed many important resolutions. Among them were one asking the Government to locate a new route for the I. C. R. between Amherst and Truro and another strongly urging the Government to redeem worn and mutilated silver coins damaged by legitimate use. One which aroused most discussion was on maritime union which resolution has been deferred for several years. Today it passed and the resolution in-

cluded that a memorial be sent to each of the three provincial Governments urging that they arrange for a meeting at an early date of representatives from each. Capt. Read of Summerside doubted if P. E. Island would at present favor union. There would need to be a campaign of education on this subject and the construction of the Tunnel should be a factor in it. Another resolution advocated the union of Canada and the British West Indies. The Board also urged that a maritime

man be appointed on the Transportation Commission and that the Government assist in grants for developing tourist work. Amherst was chosen as the next place of meeting and the result of the election of officers was:— President, Capt. Joseph Read, Summerside; Vice Pres., W. S. Fisher, St. John; A. M. Bell, Halifax; Secretary, C. N. Creed, Halifax; Auditor, M. G. DeWolfe, Kentville.

ALL TOOK EXTRA INDEMNITY

Despite Some Protests the Salary Grab has Been all Absorbed

OTTAWA, Aug. 17.—(Special)—The draft books in the Accountant's office in the House of Commons have been closed and in spite of the protestations of some members who professed to oppose the increased indemnity, every member of the Commons has accepted his extra thousand dollars. Not one dollar of the \$213,000 extra has been refused.

NO PROGRESS AT PORTSMOUTH

Small hope of Peace Now—only Chance is by Russia Giving up Sakhalin and Japan not Insisting on Indemnity.

PORTSMOUTH, Aug. 17.—(Special)—The Peace situation is just where it was a week ago. Today no progress was made. Three articles were left for discussion—the indemnity, the cession of Sakhalin and the transfer to Japan of the interned warships. The latter received the most attention but as both parties saw that while the main points of controversy were unsettled they were cautious about finally agreeing on this point, so it was at last allowed to stand over.

Tomorrow an adjournment will likely be made until Monday in order that Witte may communicate with St. Petersburg. The only prospect now for peace is that Russia give up Sakhalin and Japan not insist on an indemnity, but Witte has no authority to agree to any cession of territory and there is a pessimistic feeling that Japan will press for the fulfillment of both conditions.

THE VERDICT OF CORONER'S JURY

On the Death of the Late William D. Coffin Royalty—Suicided While Mentally Depressed

Citizens were shocked yesterday forenoon to learn of the suicide of William Coffin who resided on St. Peter's Road near the junction with the Brackley Point Road. The deceased had been disappointed for several weeks, the cause being attributed to injuries sustained by falling from a hay cutter recently. Yesterday morning he left his home after breakfast and about nine o'clock was found by Hector McRae hanging to a tree limb in a field near his house. Coroner Johnson and Marshal Cameron where at once notified and a jury composed of William Sellers, (foreman), Alexander McKay, Ambrose J. Watkins, Gorham Cook, James Connolly, James Gallant and William Smith, after being empanelled viewed the remains and adjourned to meet last night.
