MEETING POSTPONED.—Owing to illness and absence of a number of members of the School Board there was no meeting last night. It is understood that a meeting will be held in the course of a few weeks.

CITY ACCOUNTS TABLED.—The City Accounts and Annual Reports of the various departments of the City Government for the past year were tabled last night at the Council meeting and the efficient City Clerk, Mr. Geo. Nicholson, was highly commended for the promptness with which they were prepared and for their satisfactory arrangement.

RAILWAY MEASURES.—Interviewed yesterday as to measures taken to meet the coal shortage Superintendent Grady declared the railway authorities were doing everything possible to meet the emergency. The car ferry can take only twelve cars per trip and in every case the coal shipments are given preference. In order to ferry the coal it has been necessary to discontinue carrying mail and express cars which take up the room of four coal cars. The mail from Sackville is loaded at Tormentine to the lower deck of the ferry and reloaded at Borden into the mail car and brought to Charlottetown. Criticism has been offered as to the running of the car ferry, but Superintendent Grady is convinced that the captain is doing everything possible. The ferry has been lightened of every surplus weight and no more room can be made available unless the bottom is taken out of her altogether. "We have all our eggs in one basket," he said, "and we have to take mighty good care of that basket." Last week Mr. L. S. Brown, assistant superintendent of the C. N. R., made the trip to Borden for the purpose of seeing at first hand the conditions in the Straits. He dismissed matters with Superintendent Grady and returned to the mainland satisfied that everything was being done that could be done.

MUCH ISLAND FREIGHT.—There are now 230 cars of freight for the island between Sackville and Tormentine, made up as follows: 55 cars coal, 13 cars rails, etc., for the P.E.I.R., 67 tons coal for dealers and 95 cars of general merchandise. There is also a considerable quantity of freight for the island at Moncton and other points.

THE TRAINS.—The railway track was very heavy yesterday, the north west gate having packed the cuttings hard, necessitating the work of snow shovellers. Several extra ploughs. Trouble was experienced last night when one of the big engines and plough became derailed at Kinkora, while coming up from Borden. An auxiliary outfit was sent to clear up the track. At 11 p.m. the train from Georgetown had not reached Mt. Stewart and was moving over a heavy track. Elsewhere east and south of Charlottetown the line is in better condition. The track is very heavy between Kensington and Summerside. A train left Summerside going west yesterday and was going along all right. By latest reports the car ferry left Tormentine at 7 p.m. and at 11 p.m. was near Borden. Latest: The car ferry docked at 11.30 and a train left immediately for the city.

Island Veterans May Attend the Big Empire Sports

With eight or nine teams competing, there is every prospect that the mile relay race for the King's Shield at the Empire Veterans' Sports Day at London next July will be one of the outstanding events of the year. Further information just received from England at Dominion Headquarters of the G. W. V. A., at Ottawa, states that the British Isles have been divided into four, and possibly five, sections for the purposes of the race. Entries are already in from Scotland, England, Wales and the North of Ireland, as well as Australia and South Africa. In Canada the G. W. V. A. is exerting every effort to have a Canadian veterans' team entered, and New Zealand ex-service men are working towards a similar object. There is a possibility also that the Irish Free State and India may enter teams.

There will be five additional events open to veterans from all parts of the British Empire, including a one-mile race, 220-yard dash, 120-yard hurdle race, 250-yard one-legged walking race for amputation cases above the knee, 100-yard blind race between athletes. Pole vaulting will be open to Empire athletes regardless of war service or not. Officials of the Canadian High Commissioner's Office in London are also urging the G. W. V. A. to send an athletic team for the occasion.

This great athletic event will be discussed by members of the local branch of the G. W. V. A. at their meeting next Thursday night and the feasibility of sending competitors from the island will be considered. Another important matter to come up at Thursday's meeting will be the receiving of the reports of the local delegates who attended the Royal Commission session at St. John recently. The meeting starts at 8 o'clock.

Sir George Younger Obtains His Reward

LONDON, Feb. 12.—Sir George Younger, chairman of the Unionist party, one of the foremost leaders in the political field which brought about the resignation of David Lloyd George as Prime Minister, has been created a viscount. This became known today through the official publication of a list of deferred New Year's honors.

Sir George Younger was a bitter opponent of Mr. Lloyd George, and for months carried on a campaign against the Coalition Government. It was he who recommended Premier Law as the Unionist party's standard-bearer last October.

Returning Bernier

LONDON, Feb. 12.—Captain J. E. Bernier, the well-known Arctic explorer, will return to Canada in a few days after spending two months here. Capt. Bernier's mission was to procure a vessel suitable for Arctic exploration and chasing poachers who prey on seals in Canadian waters. He has been offered a box of the desired kind and a fair turn of speed and he will recommend its purchase to the Government on his return.

Capt. Bernier lectured at the Royal Colonial Institute during his stay here and was congratulated by well-known British explorers and sea captains on the energetic manner in which he has painted the Arctic a perilous red.
