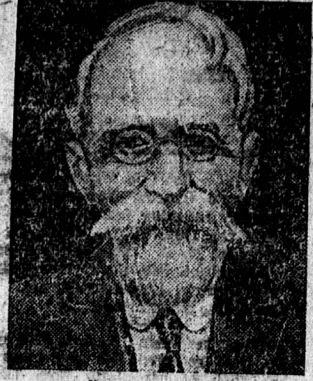

BERLIN, Ont., July 1.—The National Bicycle Championships held today drew the greatest attendance on record. The weather was warm and the racing fast, Andrews winning two firsts and McMillian two. Everything went to Toronto. G. L. Prowse, the only entry from the east rode in hard luck in most

of the races but found himself in the mile winning his heat and being beaten by only a rod in the final. He showed great improvement on last year, both in speed and judgment.

The members of the company took their parts well and were greatly appreciated in this most entertaining play.

The news of the disaster at Regina was received in Charlottetown yesterday with deep regret for the western town's misfortune and sympathy for those of its citizens so suddenly bereft.

Though a contentment separates Charlottetown and the stricken western city the capitals of P. E. Island and Saskatchewan are linked together by the many from this city and province who are now residing in the devastated town.

The Guardian and the Telegraph Office were besieged last night by anxious relatives soliciting news of the disaster and hoping for favorable word of Kith and Kin in Regina. Yesterday morning two private despatches were received in Charlottetown relative to the disaster. Owing to the interruption at Regina in the telegraph service these were telephoned to Indian Head, 42 miles east of Regina, and from there telegraphed to their destination. One was received by S. F. Hodgson announcing the pleasing fact that Miss Laura Hodgson was safe and well and her residence was untouched.

The other was received by Mrs. S. D. Nelles, Regina, at present visiting her mother, Mrs. Barrett, Charlottetown, and equally as reassuring was his news. It stated that Mr. Nelles was safe and well but that he had undergone the worst experience in his lifetime. Other parties, anxious as to the
