Lively Session In Congress

(By Canadian Press)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 16.—The word "impeachment" was heard in the House yesterday during debate on President Hoover's debt moratorium which the administration at that moment was asking a committee to approve.

A charge by Representative McFadden, Republican, Pennsylvania, in an hour-long speech, that the chief executive "proposed to sell us out to Germany," brought a dozen representatives to their feet.

A demand from a democrat, representative O'Connor of New York, that some republican "should defend the President from charges which were grounds for impeachment" followed.

While undersecretary Mills of the treasury told the ways and means committee that failure to approve the moratorium "would be an everlasting disgrace to the Government and people of the United States," representative Chipewald, Illinois republican leaped up and answered McFadden. He is a new member.

"I denounce as false and untrue my statement that the president negotiated directly with German financial interests," he said, "and encourage the statement that the president is the agent of any interest adverse to the people of the United States. If there is one article of integrity in the statement of the gentleman (McFadden) made, let the gentleman produce proof of his charges.

"If the gentleman is sincere, let him and his associates prepare articles of impeachment against the President and let those articles of impeachment be tried and let the truth be known, and let the guilt and infamy and horror all where it is due."

McFadden, ist. chairman of the banking committee, made no answer. He declared any further statement except that he would testify before the ways and means committee on the debt plan.

Meanwhile, the senate heard senator Reed of Pennsylvania, a ranking republican on the finance committee, before which Mills is to testify tomorrow, charge bankers holding foreign securities with a propaganda campaign for debt cancellation. Reed is opposed to revision of the war debts and favors the moratorium.

Rushed Aid To Dying Man

HALIFAX, N. S., Dec. 16.—(By The Canadian Press)—The schooner Mahaska, toward which a United States coastguard boat was speeding last night with aid for a dying man, is out of Lunenburg, N.
