CANADIAN CLUB.—The Guardian has received a report of the Fourth Annual Conference Association of Canadian Club for 1912-13, which was held in Fredericton last September and of which Percy Pope, Charlottetown, is the Vice-President for Prince Edward Island for the ensuing term, 1912-13. Mr. Pope was also a member of the Nominating Committee and the next phase of meeting chosen was Hamilton.

CAR FERRY.—The Prince Edward Island Department has received a notice from the Department of Railways, Ottawa, stating that on January 9th an Order in Council was signed authorizing the acceptance of the tender of Sir William C. Armstrong, Whitworth Co., Ltd., of Newcastle-on-Tyne, for the construction of a steel car ferry for Prince Edward Island, says an exchange, the tender price being £138,000 (\$690,000).

OPERATION.—W. G. Gillispie, Charlottetown, has received word from Boston stating that his son William Gillispie, the well known and popular Abegweit hockey player, had undergone an operation in the Massachusetts General Hospital and that he was doing as well as could be expected. William left here last Autumn for Winnipeg and took ill. WOMAN SUFFRAGE IS ADOPTED IN NEVADA

CARSON, Nevada, Jan. 25.—Woman suffrage passed the General Assembly here yesterday with but three dissenting votes. The measure will go to the Senate on Monday and should it pass, as is generally expected, will be submitted to popular vote at the next general election.

BROOKLYN BRIDGE RUSH HOUR PANIC

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—Brooklyn bridge was the scene last evening of one of the largest jams of humanity which the structure has probably held since its opening thirty years ago at which time a dozen persons were crushed to death. For fifty minutes during the rush hour all traffic by rail was at a standstill because of a small fire in a shed under the bridge which cut off the electric feed wires temporarily. From 100,000 to 200,000 persons were massed at New York terminal before the jam was relieved. Many passengers in the crowded trains which pulled into the terminal just as the flames became threatening were forced to climb out of the windows and many women were in a state of panic. The underground trains were so choked with crowds at the time that probably 20,000 persons walked the mile-long bridge in the rain.

HIT YOUR MAN FIRST IS JUDGE'S RULING

TORONTO, Jan. 25.—That if a man squares up to you and is near enough to strike, you are at liberty to hit him first, was the ruling of Judge Morsen in the Division Court yesterday. C. A. Pines sued W. Ridell for \$68, \$39 of which was alleged wages due and the remainder money lent. As a counter claim Ridell claimed \$60 from Pines for assault. "He squared up to me," said Pines. "That was an invitation and you accepted it," His Honor said, "and you would be justified in hitting him first if you could."

THE KING OF SPAIN MAY VISIT AMERICA

LONDON, Jan. 25.—It is stated that there is a probability that King Alfonso of Spain, will pay a visit to the United States, possibly next summer, should the political situation in his kingdom permit of his doing so. It seems that Alfonso has been greatly interested on the subject of a trip to the United States since a visit to that country by his war minister's son, and often has expressed a desire to make a journey there. It is understood that the matter is now being seriously considered by the Spanish government with a view to carrying out the desires of the king.
