ATTACKS MAY FORETELL INVASION ATTEMPT

SIX ENEMY U-BOATS VICTIMS OF CANADIANS Many Planes Are Concentrated In Northern France

RESTIGOUCHE BEARS MARKS OF CONFLICT

By John Leblanc Canadian Press Staff Writer AN EAST COAST CANADIAN PORT, Sept. 8 (CP)—Crewmen of a Canadian destroyer just returned from overseas action under the guns and bombs of the Germans believe their ship polished off a half-dozen enemy submarines during their tour of duty.

The destroyer Restigouche was among those that participated in the evacuation of British troops from St. Nazaire and other French ports before France capitulated. Its scarred sides, bearing mementoes of exploding Nazi bombs, are silent witnesses to the warmth of the actions in which the ship took part.

Got Six U Boats

"We got about six U-boats," said a member of the crew, casually. They didn't bother keeping count of the subs, he said, but that was about the number the crew figured the ship had sunk.

Nazi Bases Bombed By R.A.F. Planes

LONDON, Sept. 9 (Monday) (CP)—Bombing by the Royal Air Force of German-held channels yesterday night has offset the threat of a sea-borne invasion of Britain, the Air Ministry announced today.

A brief statement issued by the Air Ministry news service said R.A.F. bombers, striking at channel ports nearest Britain, had done extensive damage to shipping and harbor installations.

The news service said: "Enemy threats of invasion by sea were countered last night (Saturday) by a series of air attacks on channel ports during which extensive damage to shipping and harbor installations was inflicted by aircraft of the bomber command."

A statement by the Air Ministry showed that the British raiders inflicted damage much nearer home than during other nights of last week when they attacked Berlin and ranged over the Baltic coast and the Czech-Slovak border.

The Admiralty announced that five bombers and torpedo seaplanes of the fleet air arm attacked the coast of Norway and left one of them sinking and the other with a list.

Despite "poor visibility and vigorous defences," the R.A.F. dealt the following blows, the air ministry announced: "Hits at Calais, France, across from Dover, where bombs burst between the basin and the entrance to the harbor. Gun emplacements and search light batteries there also were bombed."

Bombardment of the Colmar airdrome, in France, where a hangar was hit and aircraft set afire.

Fires started by bombs at Boulogne, France. Direct hits on barges at Ostend, Belgium, and heavy attacks on barges at Dunkerque, France.

Attacks on the Krupp works at Essen, war factories at Emden and Zwickbrucken, and the oil plant at Gelsenkirchen, all in Germany, were successful.

ILLSLEY SEES DICTATORS ON WAY TO DEFEAT

Finance Minister Appeals for Support of New War Loan.

OTTAWA, Sept. 8 (CP)—Canadians must accomplish by voluntary action more than the enemy can do by compulsion if the war against totalitarian domination is to be won, Finance Minister Ilesley warned tonight in a broadcast appeal for support of the second war loan.

Speaking over a national network of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, Mr. Ilesley called for a generous response to the \$300,000,000 loan which will open across Canada tomorrow morning.

"The enemy is sparing no effort to maintain his fighting force at the maximum," the minister said. "No luxuries, no comforts, little, nothing even of the necessities are allowed for his civilian population. They are not asked to co-operate, they are compelled to obey."

Mr. Ilesley was optimistic of the outcome and expressed confidence in the people of Canada to voluntarily make whatever sacrifices are necessary to carry out successfully the tremendous war task the Dominion has set itself.

Whereas two months ago there were people on this continent who feared that Britain must soon disappear today the whole world is becoming convinced that a nation which can produce men and machines like those of the Royal Air Force is invincible.

President Of Paraguay Is Killed In Crash

ASUNCION, Paraguay, Sept. 8 (AP)—Gen. Jose Felix Estigarribia, President of Paraguay for 18 months, was killed Saturday in an airplane crash. The plane ran into fog near its destination. The pilot also died in the crash.

The cabinet today designated War Minister Gen. Estigarribia as successor.

The 52-year-old hero of the Chaco war with Bolivia had been president of Paraguay since April 30, 1939.

Concentrated In Northern France

Most Critical Month Of War, British Military Authority Says. "We Remain Fully Confident".

(By Sam Robertson, Canadian Press Staff Writer) LONDON, Sept. 9 (Monday)—(CP Cable)—German raiders killed at least 400 and painted the sky over London blood red with widespread fires in a week-end of terror that may prove to be the prelude to an attempt at invasion.

Great numbers of planes which had been stationed in Norway now are poised in northern France within two minutes' flight of Britain.

Goering is reported to be in that sector directing the Luftwaffe's increasing attacks against the embattled British Isles.

That alone seems to indicate that the Nazis consider the present phase of the war vital.

There are other reasons, which may not be discussed for the belief that Hitler is preparing to make a tremendous gamble at invasion possibly within the next few weeks.

"This is the most critical month of the war," a high military source told me.

"The increasing crescendo of air attacks has not yet reached a high note but it is possible it may mean the Nazis hope to have things their own way in a week or so.

"We remain fully confident." This statement, forbidding in the possibility it held out for the immediate future but reassuring because of the genuine note of contagious confidence expressed in the last sentence, was given me in an air raid shelter last night.

War—25 Years Ago Today

Sept. 9, 1915—United States requested recall of Dr. Constantine Dumba, Austrian-Hungarian envoy to Washington, because of his activity in attempting to cripple American plans making war supplies for the allies.

A formation totalling 700 planes was used against Britain in the day and night attacks. The Royal Air Force and gun crews around knocked down 99 of them.

Three Women Die In Crash

SUBSBURY, Ont., Sept. 8 (CP)—Three Espanola women were killed instantly while on their way to Church today when the automobile in which they were riding was struck by the locomotive of a fast passenger train at a level crossing 26 miles west of here.

Killed were Mrs. Charles Shames, 43; her mother-in-law, Mrs. Albert Shames, 75; and Mrs. Louis Shames, 30. The driver of the car, Charles Shames, 60, Espanola, suffered severe shock and minor cuts and bruises.

The Canadian Pacific Railway train was travelling approximately 50 miles an hour at the moment of impact and wreckage of the car was strewn for more than 100 yards along the right-of-way. The car was struck immediately behind the rear door.
