E. Island. The Stars expected a hot time and were evidently prepared for it and from the start played their best, with the result that they came off more than conquerors, having literally wiped the ice with their opponents.

When half time was called the score stood 18 to 1 in favor of the Stars. The second half resulted in a score of 15—0, making a total of

33—1 in favor of the Summerside team. Most of the goals were scored by McDonald and Grady.
