RUSS HOTEL. From East to West, wherever Mr. King sets his foot, promises of every kind are let in his trail. They are easy made, when you don't intend to keep them. But they are causing trouble in his own camp. For instance some of his Quebec followers think that he is in real earnest in what he is promising to the West, and they are getting uneasy over it. If he really intends to carry them out it spells disaster to the industrial East, and the older province to be most unmercifully taxed for the benefit of the West. His quiet hints that these are only election baits, with a barbed hook behind, won't go down, for before them is the painful recollection that the hand of Progressives can make him deliver the goods.

There is a striking similitude between the late Horace Greeley and our own Mackenzie King. Horace called a hunch that he was destined to become President of the United States, and in one of his utterances declared, "I will be anything to be President." His higher minded opponent announced, "I would rather be RIGHT than be President." Greeley was defeated, Mackenzie King, in promise, and in practice has been a true apostle of the Greeley doctrine. He will be anything to be Premier. He is willing to be the tool of Progressives, to agree to any breeze or following course of public policy, to promise to any section of the country whatever they may demand, to make or smash any of the sacred J. principles of Liberalism; anything and everything if you will only make him Premier.

Mr. King is to be here on Wednesday. Keep your eyes peeled for promises. When he spills out his cornucopia of good things, you will marvel at the rich display. You may also wonder why it was that in his five years of government, he never showed you those pretty
