THE EXAMINER AND THE LAW.

Yesterday the Examiner, which the day before had made its editorial column a mere echo of the saloon, showed a disposition to "hedge" on the prohibition question. There are rather too many staunch temperance men and prohibitionists in the Conservative party of Prince Edward Island to permit the party organ to become and remain the open advocate of liquor lawlessness. A new organ would become an imperative necessity and might speedily be called into existence should the Examiner persist in the course on which it set out so jauntily. Hence the hedging apparent in its issue of yesterday.
The Examiner now poses as an advocate of "honesty and sincerity of action" and as opposed to the "dishonesty, insincerity and deceit in connection with temperance and prohibition." These fine phrases, however, give no evidence of any real change of heart on the part of the Examiner. On the contrary its very language on this point is still the common talk of the saloon. For, be it observed that it is only on the temperance and prohibition side that it finds these vicious tendencies and qualities. The saloon keeper who violates license law, Scott Act and Prohibition Act in turn and is convicted and punished for such violation, is quite good enough to escape the Examiner's censure. Such an one is quite above "dishonesty," or "insincerity" or "deceit." Nor is the rumrunner in any way chargeable for "the lamentable increase in drunkenness and disobedience to law." It is to the insincerity of temperance men that this is due!

The temperance people, the prohibitionists and all law abiding citizens will understand the Examiner's attitude of yesterday precisely as they understood its attitude of the day before. The saloon man will understand it in precisely the same way. All will see that the Examiner at heart would gladly give all possible aid and comfort to those who are violating liquor law. It would gladly place every obstacle in the way of the law being enforced, but the limits of prudence require that it shall not carry this sort of thing too far. It is as we said yesterday of its attitude toward prohibition, "willing to wound but still afraid to strike."

ENGLAND'S RIVALS.

SHANGHAI, June 11.—Admiral Sir Edward H. Seymour, British commander in chief on the Chinese station, was the principal guest of the China Association at its annual banquet last evening. During the course of a speech protesting against the policy of trade exclusion, the admiral said Great Britain had three powerful rivals, the United States, Russia and Germany. Of the three the United States was the greatest of her trade rivals.

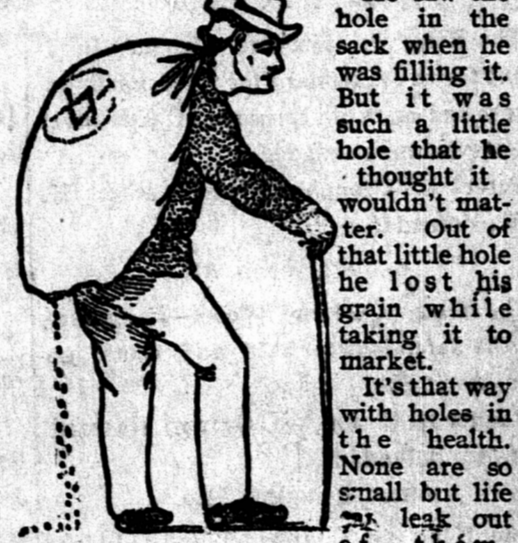

Scott Act in Kentville.

A correspondent sends the following very interesting news from Kentville: It will soon be two years since anything was done by the Temperance Committee in the way of prosecuting the rumrunners. Finding that it was useless to put evidence in the hands of the Inspector inasmuch as he would not strive to get convictions—the Town Council being diametrically opposed to us and also the Town Squire—we determined to enter suits against the rumrunners before two magistrates outside the town, one member, the Rev. Mr. Gaetz, Methodist minister, acting as Prosecutor. We won our cases but the rumrunner's lawyer applied for a writ of certiorari on the ground that the magistrate's court was not competent to try cases under the Canada Temperance Act. His plea before Judge Townsend was that it is ultra vires of said Act and of the Dominion Parliament to appoint two magistrates to try cases of alleged violation of its provisions because the Confederation Act gave power to Local Legislatures only to constitute courts and the Legislature of Nova Scotia had not constituted two magistrates a court to try such cases. Judge Townsend allowed the application. Our lawyer then induced the Dominion Cabinet to submit a case to the Supreme Court of Canada but the Judges refused to consider such a case till it came before them by way of appeal. The matter has consequently been before the Courts till this spring when a decision was given in our favor the rumrunners being compelled to pay all costs—no small sum. We have thus gained a notable victory and the decision is one which should be widely known. TRUTH.

He has passed the late examination successfully, and recently was notified to appear for the duty. He will probably be assigned to the bicycle squad.

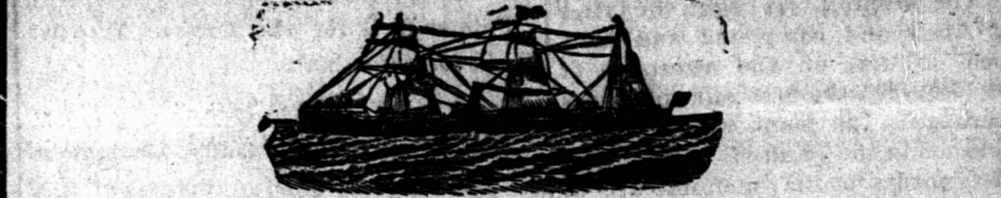
