ANOTHER ISLANDER TO THE FRONT.—The following clipping is from a Calgary exchange:—Mr. Arthur G. Cameron, barrister of Vancouver, B. C., a former Rhodes Scholar, spent a day with his father, D. G. Cameron, formerly of Montague, P. E. Island, and his sister, Mrs. H. P. Wright, 1205, 15th Ave. West, on his way to England to rejoin his regiment, King Edwards Horse, the Kings Overseas Dominion regiment, formerly known as the Kings Colonials. Mr. Cameron is second in command of C. Squadron, composed of Rhodes Scholars and colonial undergraduates attending Oxford and Cambridge. Mr. Cameron was attached to the King's Royal Irish Hussars in 1909 and holds certificates from the School of Musketry, Hythe, Kent, as musketry instructor and Maxim Gun instructor in the British Army. Before the outbreak of hostilities, Mr. Cameron held his regiment offering to serve in the continent in case of war. In response last week he received the message: "Rejoin your command in King Edwards' Horse," an intimation that the regiment goes to the front. Mrs. Cameron and infant daughter accompanied him to Montreal from which port he sailed on the S. S. Audanian on the 29th inst.

Excellent music was provided throughout the evening, the bagpipes being a particular feature of the program.
